The October appearance of Paul Boutelle, candidate for vice president of the United States on the Socialist Workers Party ticket, on the OU campus caused a furor of controversy and again raised the issue of academic freedom. The Oklahoma Daily published the following comments, some by persons involved with the Boutelle visit, some made much earlier. The Daily labeled these quotations "Points to Ponder." We present them with two additions, the resolution passed unanimously by the OU chapter of the American Association of University Professors in a special meeting on Oct. 31 and an earlier statement by Dr. Cross on academic freedom.
