A Resignation

Faced with an opportunity so good he couldn't pass it up, Verne C. Kennedy Jr., vice president for operations, will leave OU this month to join Hayek Engineering Corp., Zurich, Switzerland. He will be executive vice president and chief executive officer of the firm's new American operation.

Kennedy has been at OU 12 years in varying capacities. Most recently he was in charge of the physical operation of the campus including its buildings, its grounds, its food service and its security.

Hayek Engineering is a Swiss based international management consulting and engineering company whose activities include management consulting, long-term planning, survey and feasibility studies, project planning, equipment operation, construction management supervision, management of operation, and diversification studies.

Femme Fellows

Women who intended to become teachers and didn't or did but have left the field and want to go back are eligible to apply for one of the 35 Danforth Foundation graduate fellowships for women.

Geared specifically for the woman who has a first degree but was unable to continue graduate work for reasons of job or family, the awards will vary between \$3,000 and \$4,000 but may be less if no real financial need exists. They are to be used to prepare the woman for full time teaching at the college or secondary level. Preference will be given to women who can complete the work before age 50.

Those interested in the program must take portions of the Graduate Record Exam before mid-December and must be able to participate in a June seminar for fellows. Searching

The faculty-alumni-student-staff committee charged with searching for a new president for the University is expected to begin work in earnest this month. A few weeks were taken up setting up the mechanics of the committee and securing nominations for its membership.

While the committee will be doing the initial looking and interviewing, anyone who has a likely candidate for the presidency is welcome to submit the name to the committee through the regents' office at OU.

A number of deans on campus have been mentioned as potential candidates as have several people who were once on the faculty and are now elsewhere. No one is placing any heavy bets on any potential candidate right now, although nearly everyone believes that the next president will either be someone now on campus or someone who has been here in the past.

The procedure the committee probably will follow is to narrow the list of candidates to perhaps two or three and then submit those names to the regents, perhaps ranked according to preference. It will then be up to the regents to extend an offer. Should the choices reject the offer, then the process would have to be started anew.
