In the six years that have passed since the revival of *Sooner Magazine*, scores of faculty, alumni, students and friends of the University of Oklahoma have been featured on its pages. Fortunately, unlike the fabled *Sports Illustrated* cover jinx, appearing in *Sooner Magazine* seems to have been a good omen for these special people; an update on their activities seems in order.

Heading the list is, of course, the new chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, Admiral William J. Crowe Jr., who probably would have received his appointment even without authoring "Promoting Peace in Asia" for our spring 1984 issue. Crowe's commencement address to the OU Class of 1986 appears on Page 10.

Edwin G.
