## Ground Control to Major Mom

For those interested in "Tuning In to Eagle Cam" in the Fall 2009 Sooner Magazine, two 2010 fledgling Bald Eagles, carrying solar-powered, GPS satellite transmitters, built flight muscle and learned to catch fish, turtles and other tasty treats in the Sooner State's summer heat. Biologists from Oklahoma Biological Survey's Sutton Avian Research Center in OU's College of Arts and Sciences placed the two-plus ounce, backpack-mounted units on the eaglets May 26, about a week prior to first flight.

While no Bald Eagles nested in Oklahoma in 1985, over 120 pairs of Sutton's reintroduced national birds now nest in our state. These two eaglets are "grand eaglets or great-grand ea-

glets" of 275 young released throughout the southeastern U.S. by the Center. If technology and birds survive, hope is to follow the youngsters 2-3 years to study movements and habitats deemed critical for survival of young.

Interested readers can visit www. suttoncenter.org to view maps showing movements of the eagles. "Eagle Tracking Information" at left side of page explains, with photographs, extensive efforts to mount transmitters. The eagles are expected to move north into

Canada during summer's heat and back to Oklahoma by early winter, but biologists, like viewers, are waiting to see where the birds actually go. More satellite transmitters are to be mounted during next year's nesting season.
