Pride of Oklahoma members will have a little extra pep in their step this fall when the OU marching band takes Owen Field with brand-new uniforms for the first time in a dozen years. The uniforms are 30 percent lighter in weight—keeping even America's hottest marching band cooler—and are made by Fruhauf Uniforms, the Pride's official outfitter since 1932.



Two "supermassive" black holes have been discovered in Markarian 231, the quasar closest to Earth, by astrophysicist Xinyu Dai from OU's Homer L. Dodge Department of Physics and Astronomy and Youjun Lu of the National Astronomical Observatories of China. Quasars are active galaxies with an illuminated center. Dai used observations from NASA's Hubble Space Telescope to detect the holes, which are different sizes and together known as a "binary black hole."
