UDALL SCHOLAR

OU honors student and citizen of the Seneca-Cayuga Nation Maya B. Henderson has been named a 2019 Udall Scholar. The award recognizes undergraduates who demonstrate a commitment to the environment or to Native American public policy or health care. Henderson is a junior pursuing a bachelor's degree in environmental sustainability in the OU College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences with a special interest in studying urban environmental concerns. Her career goal is to create viable frameworks for green city development after earning a Ph.D. in geography.



New stent for aneurysms

OU Medicine neurosurgeons are the first to use a new medical device to prevent aneurysm rupture and recurrence — without opening a patient's skull. Professor and neurosurgeon Bradley Bohnstedt has been using the Surpass Streamline Stent to divert the flow of blood away from an aneurysm, which greatly decreases its potential for rupture. The advantage of the device is that it is designed to treat larger aneurysms in more areas of the brain. "We're treating far more aneurysms with the Surpass Stent than we previously treated," Bohnstedt says.

OU Law wins national championship

The University of Oklahoma College of Law was crowned the national champion of this year's Federal Bar Association Thurgood Marshall Memorial Moot Court Competition, marking the fourth national competition championship for OU Law in the past two years and placing the college among the top law schools in the nation for moot court. The OU team of second-year law students Taylor Freeman Peshehonoff of Ada, Okla., and Bakhtawar (Becky) Hafiz of Denton, Texas, competed in five rounds, prevailing over 39 other teams.
