FIVE MOONS LOUNGE

This spring, OU Native American students celebrated the dedication of the new Five Moons Lounge in Copeland Hall. "Five Moons" was the name given to Native American ballerinas Yvonne Chouteau, Rosella Hightower, Moscelyne Larkin and sisters Maria and Marjorie Tallchief, who were all from Oklahoma. OU's American Indian Programs and Services surveyed more than 2,400 Indigenous OU students for help choosing the name. The lounge includes a kitchenette, sofas and a fully renovated study space.

Professor wins national literary award

A book of poetry by OU English professor Honorée Fanonne Jeffers was honored in March with the 2021 NAACP Image Award for Outstanding Literary Work – Poetry. Jeffers received the award for her collection of poems, The Age of Phillis (Wesleyan University Press, 2020), which is based upon 15 years of archival research on the life and times of Phillis Wheatley Peters, a formerly enslaved African, who, in 1773, became the first Black American woman to publish a book. The Age of Phillis is also a finalist for the 2021 PEN/Volcker Award and the 2021 Los Angeles Times Book Prize in Poetry.



Promising treatment for brain tumors

An OU Health Stephenson Cancer Center surgical and medical team has performed its first brachytherapy procedure for brain tumors, a process in which radioactive "seeds" are implanted around the edges of the tumor site after it has been removed. The surgery, the first known in Oklahoma, treats the cancer internally, rather than from an outside radiation source. "Brachytherapy allows us to give a therapeutic dose of radiation but minimize the spread," says OU neurosurgeon Chad Glenn, who performed the surgery.

More than 150 OU College of Dentistry students, residents, faculty and staff joined area dentists and hygienists to provide 60 Oklahoma veterans with free dental care at a spring clinic held at the OU College of Dentistry. During the event, 118 dental and dental hygiene students participated, as well as oral surgery residents. Volunteers performed a wide array of procedures, ranging from routine cleanings and fillings to more complex procedures like crowns and extractions.
