

about them. Bartering over price is not an insult, but questioning the quality of the wares is. In fact, although generally cruder than the exquisitely handwrought brass of Persia or Syria, the articles are for the most part made in lofts over the shops, where lathe machines are no doubt employed, but no mass production methods, and they are the nearest approach to handmade articles of everday utility that are produced in this country.

The windows of the shops are tiny, as though glass were a luxury, but they glitter in the gloom with their overweight of display. The people in the streets wear European clothes, of course, but as though uncomfortable and somewhat strange. Their eyes often have that glint produced




