#### Soonerland Briefs

C. was in the headlines again in November when John Fortson, Oklahoma Daily editor, '34as, Tecumseh, said editorially that an alumnus of the secret organization had told him two students were lectured since the famous Bill Stephens case of last winter. After a day's ride in headlines, the excitement died down when the alumnus failed to produce evidence of the existence and campus members of D. D. M. C. stated positively that the group was disbanded since its members were suspended from school and then reinstated last December.

Ann Lennington, Muncie, Indiana, and Mary Hatt Hively, '34as, Muskogee, were in a hospital in Oklahoma City for several weeks following an automobile accident Homecoming eve. They were in a car driven by Warren Wolverton, '33ex, Lawton, the night before the Homecoming game when the accident occurred in Oklahoma City. Wolverton was not injured seriously.

E. Robert Schmitz, French pianist, was to play a recital November 23 on the University campus.

A dance drama will be given December 18 at the University auditorium by Orchesis, dance organization, under the direction of Miss Helen Gregory, physical education instructor. An interpretation of "The Juggler of Notre Dame" will be offered by the group in the Christmas program.

The low down on the Urschel kidnaping trial was given the campus on two different occasions. Herbert K. "Slick" Hyde,'20ex, United States district autorney, gave the inside story to law students and Lee Hills, Oklahoma News reporter, told the story to journalism students from the newspaper angle.
A. J. "Dad" Elliott, colorful interna-

tional boys worker for the past twentyfive years, was a campus visitor late in October.

The University League of Young Democrats has brought three well known speakers to the campus during the past month. They were E. W. Marland, Ponca City, O. M. Mosier, Oklahoma City manager, and Tom Anglin, speaker of the state house of representatives.

Students of the business college almost made a study of the innermost secrets of the nickle slot machine recently. The Oklahoma Daily announced that a business college class would take apart one of the machines which was confiscated by county officers. The proposed study was brought to an abrupt halt when Dean Arthur B. Adams announced, "If any faculty members are unable to find satisfactory legitimate problems to discuss before classes it will be necessary to make a change in the personnel of the faculty of the college of business administration."

Virginia Lee, '37as, a straight-A student of Bartlesville high school and

freshman queen, added another honor to her list of accomplishments. She won second place in the posture contest held during health week.

A charge that fraternity leaders were not seriously attempting to revise rush rules as they were asked by President W. B. Bizzell was made editorially by the Oklahoma Daily. The editorial commented: "They are setting out to dupe President Bizzell and the board of regents. They want to change rush rules just enough to please officials without making any serious alterations." The interfraternity council has been asked to adopt a new plan for rush.

Professor Hoople, a faculty Walter Winchell, returned to the columns of the Oklahoma Daily with a weekly column of comments on campus activities, especially among the faculty.

Plans to have Duke Ellington, famed negro band leader, play a concert at the University fell through when the sponsoring men's council could not obtain faculty sanction for the program. The great Duke was unable to play on the campus any Friday or Saturday night and University regulations prevented his playing on week nights.

Merle Coleman, '37as, brawny Sigma Alpha Epsilon pledge of Tulsa, won the annual battle-royal held at the interfrater-

nity council mixer.

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John Gould Fletcher, world known poet, spoke on "Tradition and Experiment in Contemporary Literature" at the University in November. The noted Arkansan, a leader in the imagist school of verse, said there was no tradition in contemporary literature and that most of the experiment was concerned with form.

Carl B. Stone, '34fa, Sand Springs, is directing the Pauls Valley Community Band while he is attending his final year

Alpha Chi Omega held a district convention at the University November 17, 18 and 19. Members of the national sorority from Kansas, Missouri and Texas chap-

ters attended the meeting.

A pair of Sooner track stars of past years ran first and third in a triangular meet November 11 at Stillwater. Glen Dawson,'32as, won the race over the fivemile course and Harold Keith,'28as, ran third. The Sooner varsity won the team competition, defeating Oklahoma Aggies and Edmond Teachers.

President Bizzell spoke on "Tendencies Toward Centralization in Education" at the annual meeting of the National Association of State Universities in November at Chicago. He discussed the plan of the "Greater University of Oklahoma" as an example of centralization in education.

A chance to see the World's Fair fan dancer in motion pictures was denied University students in November when the mayor of Norman and ministers protested against the showing at the Sooner theater after the film already had been booked. The "protection of student morals" was one of the reasons for stopping the showing.

May Gets Appointment

The new assistant municipal counselor of Oklahoma City is Ralph J. May, '31law, who was appointed by City Manager Orval Mosier to fill the vacancy left through the resignation of Robert P. Hill, Jr., '29law.

May will handle county court appeals from the city police court. More than six hundred piled up during the interim of Hill's resignation and May's appointment.

The Daily Oklahoman reported the

appointment:

"May said his appointment 'hardly is an elevation, in one sense.' He revealed that in 1925, while a student at Central high school here, he was police judge for a day and that in 1926 he served as mayor for one day."

May is remembered on the campus as student council dance manager for the athletic association the year it was in charge of dances. He and his wife, Dorothy Champlin May, 32as, are living at 1133 Northwest Thirty-eighth Street in Oklahoma City.

# Nuhfers to Pittsburgh

The talented Nuhfer family, Leo, '31 pet eng, and Olive, '32fa, has moved to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where he will be an instructor of petroleum engineering at the University of Pittsburgh.

He was named on the faculty by H. C. George who resigned last summer as director of the University school of petroleum engineering to accept a similar position at Pittsburgh.

Mrs. Nuhfer was one of the most talented artists ever graduated from the University art school. Last year, she painted a mural in the new St. John's Episcopal church in Norman. Other of her mural works are in University buildings.

Dr. Joseph W. Bird, '27M.A., is one of the juvenile delinquency experts who addressed school teachers of New York City at a special school held at the City Police Academy this fall, according to the New York Sun.

Dr. Bird spoke on "Crime Cost and Expenditures" in October and will summarize the five-months course in January for the 450 school teachers enrolled. He is affiliated with the College of the City of New York where he engaged in graduate work after he completed his study at the University.

### Letter from Venezuela

Jose A. Delgado, '33eng, is now government petroleum inspector at "El Cubo," Estado Zulia, Venezuela. He came to the University in the fall of 1930 and studied three years in residence for his degree in petroleum engineering.

In an open letter to his classmates and friends, Delgado writes from Venezuela:

"I am certainly missing terribly my good days at the University. The friendship, hospitality and kind disposition toward me from the people of Oklahoma made out of my personality a blind and unconditional follower of such a community. If there is something that I never would forget it is the fact of being myself one of the '33 O. U. graduates with the greatest possible fondness a graduate could have for his school. Count me always a good Sooner."

Lloyd Truman Praised

A long account of an address made recently by Lloyd W. Truman, '23as, in Bridgeport, Connecticut was carried in the daily Bridgeport paper.

It praised Truman's knowledge of recent European history and pictured him as one of the most interesting of the young faculty members at the Bridgeport Central high school. The University of Oklahoma Student Loan association was enriched by approximately \$5,000, and a valuable collection of books was given to the library from the estate of Miss Minnie Mae Forbes, '10as, '11M.A., instructor in English who died this fall.

Her will provided that insurance policies worth about \$4,500 and property valued at about \$1,000 should go to the University loan fund, according to Richard Pendleton, '26law, Cleveland county judge, who probated the will. The American First Trust company of Oklahoma City was made executor of the estate under terms of the will.
