Everyone else who came to enjoy the festivities of Homecoming eve, the events of Homecoming day and the thrill of swamping Missouri was in gay spirits when dusk came to the Soonerland campus. It had been a gala dinner and dance the previous evening at the Hotel Biltmore in Oklahoma City, a colorful parade Homecoming morning and a great day for the Sooner football team.

The five hundred alumni who attended the dinner and dance heard a number of celebrities deliver talks and enjoyed a dance that started immediately after din-

ner was finished.

Fisher Ames, the Oklahoma City Alumni club president, was master of ceremonies and he went down the line in a scintillating style introducing celebrities present. There were plenty of them, too.

President W. B. Bizzell and Bob Hill, secretary of the Missouri alumni association and president of Rotary International,

were the main speakers.

But there were others. Eugene Ledbetter, popular young Oklahoma City attorney and member of the board of regents, was one of them. He introduced Earl Foster, Oklahoma City attorney, in a style Earl never enjoyed before and probably never will again.

"I expected to come in contact with a lot of office seekers when I was appointed to the board of regents," Ledbetter declared, "but, much to my surprise, I have been troubled with only one person. That is none other than our own Earl Foster, who has continually bothered me to get him appointed to the position of Dean of

Women at the University."

Foster made a fitting rebuttal and Fisher Ames went on down the line—Guy Y. Williams, chief executive of the athletic association, Coach Lewie Hardage, Assistant Coach John "Bo" Rowland, W. C. The parade Homecoming morning was

more colorful than usual as it wound through Norman's streets. A float entered by the University high school won first place, while one entered by Alpha Xi Delta took second place.

A near riot occurred on the varsity corner when the Ruf Neks had one of their members painted black and wearing a Jazz Hound sweater on their float. The Jazz Hounds, marching two floats back, rushed the Ruf Neks, but the colored member climbed to the top of the cab on the truck and succeeded in escaping the rival pep club members.

The alumni executive board met at noon in the Oklahoma Union for its semiannual business session, while other alumni separated in private groups for lunch-

The football game was a colorful contest as a fine Oklahoma team clicked to smother Missouri by five touchdowns. Ben Poynor scored two of them, while John Miskovsky, Nig Robertson and K. A. Cox scored one each. It was the worst drubbing the Sooners ever handed the Missourians in the history of their football relations.

The Norman Alumni club was host at a reception in the Oklahoma Union immediately after the game. Mrs. Guy Y. Williams, the new president of the Norman Alumni club, was in charge of the reception, while other Norman Sooners were hosts. Mary Elizabeth Simpson was in charge of the tea table.



Regents Vote Scholarships

Winners of curricular events at the Oklahoma Interscholastic meet will be given scholarships to attend the University of Oklahoma, the board of regents decided at its fall meeting on the campus.

The regents voted than any senior high school student who wins five points or more in curricular events will be given free tuition at the University that fall. Students may win two second place awards, scoring three points each, or a second place and two thirds, so long as they score at least five points.

Not only will free general tuition be given all winners of five points, but laboratory fees will be waived in certain courses if the student won points in that high school competition. For instance, winner of the chemistry contest will be given a scholarship for general tuition fees and also will be allowed to enroll in University chemistry courses without paying the usual laboratory fee.

High school scholarship winners who make at least "B" averages during their first semester will be granted an extension of the scholarship to cover the second semester, the board of regents decided.

The scholarship offers will open next May at the Oklahoma Interscholastic meet, according to Emil R. Kraettli, '18ex, secretary of the board. Scholarships have been offered for many years to winners of musical contests.

The plan was adopted to encourage students to make better preparation in their high school courses and also to encourage the better students to attend the University.
