

Whatever it was, it enabled Sneed to accomplish what would be impossible today. He talked so hard and fast to the head of a certain department that that august gentleman added six hours of credit to the card of the student politician. But Sneed's victory was short lived. Just as the second semester was drawing to a close, the registrar regretfully informed him that six hours had been added to his record through a mistake, and because he had not earned the credits, it would be impossible for him to graduate. Accordingly, Sneed left the University in the spring of 1910, and did not return until three years later when he received his belated degree upon completing his work.

Politicians, "apple polishers," students, and brothers in the bonds of fraternity life, these Sooners of 1910 were among the pioneers of the state. They helped to make the University what it is today.

They contributed songs and yells. They formed traditions that have lived until today and will continue to live as long as the University exists.

Some, like Sneed; can look back over their college life and rue the passing of the "good old days," when a car, that is, if anyone had a car, was allowed on the campus, when they could dance until dawn, and when no "Approved Rooms" signs determined where they might park their trunks.

Many, like Sneed, have sent their sons and daughters to follow in their footsteps. Earl Sneed, Jr., is a member of the same fraternity, enjoys the same sports and entertainments, and has made a name for himself on the campus just as did his father. But not yet, in this day of modern rules and regulations, has he been permitted to keep his date out after midnight.

athletics, started a search for an intramural secretary—one that could do the job and do it well.

When Owen learned that Polly wanted to come back to school to work on a master's degree the worry was over—here was the man for the job.

But the Wallace who sits in the intramural office in the Fieldhouse today isn't the same Polly that was once a student here. A stroke of paralysis has changed his outward appearance—on the inside there has been no alteration.

The crutches, the cane and the acute pain that haunts the victim of paralysis have never dampened the spirits of the man who was chosen as center on the all-time Oklahoma football team.

A single example will serve to show the value of Polly to the football teams of 1925, '26 and '27.

An extreme dislocation of the knee in the Kansas Aggie game of 1926 forced him to leave the game at the end of the third period, after having played on the injured leg for a full quarter.

Huddled on the bench in the last quarter, Wallace watched his disheartened teammates who had piled up a 12-point margin, go down to a stunning 15-to-12 defeat.

His name was mentioned in connection with at least three all-American football selections in 1926, and the late Knute Rockne accorded him the extreme honor of placing him on an all-American eleven.

As a baseball player of those years he took a back seat to nobody. It was with the aid of his powerful drives that the conference baseball trophy rested in Oklahoma's possession during his time in school.

Polly is taking advantage of a year's leave of absence from East Central State Teachers college where he is head coach, to complete work on his master's degree.

Under Wallace's guidance the East Central athletes gained state collegiate championships in football, wrestling and baseball in 1930. Since he took over the reins at Ada, the college has never fallen below third place in the state collegiate conference standings.

A few of his activities while in school here which might be listed included the Letzeiser gold medal for scholastic and activity honors, decided upon by student vote; student council; brown derby winner of Sigma Delta Chi, honorary journalistic fraternity; Sigma Nu; Jazz Hounds' trophy for most valuable football player in 1926; and all-Missouri Valley center, 1925 and '26.

When he steps on the platform next June to accept a master's degree in geology, the books will be closed on a man who proved to some of the "old guard" that an athlete could be a scholar and an activity man.

Now there is 16-year-old Austin, jr., captain and quarterback of the Ada high school eleven last fall, coming along.

If the dreams of the father come true it is possible that some day Oklahoma will witness another Wallace in action, displaying some of the same versatile qualities that Polly did ten years ago.
