ELVIRA ADELLE JONES

"Her loyalty and enthusiasm were an inspira-tion to all." This is the tribute of her sorority to Elvira Jones, 23as, in the May, 1934, issue of the Arrow of Pi Beta Phi, a few weeks after her passing in March of that year, at her home in

That inscription is echoed in the hearts of everyone who knew her. For a spirit which was lovely and unselfish infused itself into the hearts and souls of her friends. Loved by students and faculty members alike, she is characterized as an enthusiastic student, with an alert mind, and a

generous and loving heart. Elvira's love of life and her genuine interest in the world about her, did not begin with her entrance into the University of Oklahoma. two years she studied at the University of Tulsa, where she was proclaimed one of the most popular girls on the campus, and where she excelled in scholarship, dramatics, and oratory. An active member of a local sorority, she was at the center of campus social life. Her unselfishness and her generosity were written indelibly through her student activities. With the vision born of such a spirit, she reached forward through the years, and peering past the obstacles which loomed beher, worked toward the affiliation of her local group with a national sorority. But she was destined to leave that campus and join another national group at the University of Oklahoma. It was here that she pledged Pi Beta Phi, and it was to that group that she gave herself wholeheartedly and unselfishly.

Soon after her graduation, Elvira contracted an illness which was ultimately to result in her passing. For several years, she suffered, but although her body was racked with pain, her spirit remained ever young, and her mind alert and vigorous. Soon, however, through her indomitable

will, she was able to leave her bed, and to associate with her friends once more. It was during this period in her life that she cultivated her talent for writing, and many magazines have published her poems and children's stories. Ever ambitious, ever striving, Elvira was able to overcome much of her physical weakness, and to secure employment in a Tulsa gift shop, surrounded by the beauty and the atmosphere that she loved. For only a short time, though, was she able to devote herself to this work, as even the slight exertion of her employment once more lowered

Elvira passed away suddenly and quietly as she would have wished. For, active and alert to the end of her life, she defied the illness which slowly took its toll.

Surely such a generous and loving spirit was in the heart of Charles Wagner when he wrote: 'All the strength of the world, and all its beauty, all true joy, everything that consoles, that feeds hope, or throws a ray of light along our dark paths, everything that makes us see across our poor lives a splendid goal and a boundless fu-ture, comes to us from people of simplicity, those who have made another object of their desires than the passing satisfaction of selfishness and vanity, and have understood that the art of living is to give one's life."-By Mary Kimbrough,'35.

Pendleton raises dogs as a hobby, and always had a corner somewhere that would serve as a guest room for Tripod.

The dog never abused the hospitality. As soon as the weather cleared, Tripod would be off about



his own business, and probably would not show up again until the weather became bad.
