Roy S. Johnson, '10ex, of Newkirk, has been given a highly responsible position by his election as president of the Federal Land Bank of Wichita, Kan. He succeeds Hugh L. Harrell, president for two years, who has returned to private banking.

Mr. Johnson has resigned as president of the Albright Title and Trust Company at Newkirk in order to take the Wichita position. He went to work with the Albright company as soon as he left the University, first in a minor position as field man and land examiner. He later was made secretary, then vice-president

Davison succeeds Busby

One Sooner alumnus succeeded another on the State Supreme Court when Justice Orel Busby, '14law, resigned.

The new justice is Denver N. Davison, 'i5law, who was named by Gov. E. W.

Marland to serve out Justice Busby's unexpired term. The term runs until January, 1939.

Mr. Busby announced that he was resigning to enter private practice of law and to look after his farming and stock raising interests near Ada. However, political observers said he might be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for senator or governor if political developments gave him a favorable outlook.

Mr. Busby returned to the practice of law with the formation of a new firm at Ada, consisting of Mr. Busby, his former partner, Lowrey H. Harrell, '16law and now president of the University of Oklahoma Association; and Albert Trice, formerly of Hugo.

Justice Davison, whose home also is at Ada, has never held public office before, but has a substantial background of law practice at Lehigh, Coalgate and Ada. He was state president of the League of

Young Democrats in 1922.

He was a member of Alpha Tau Omega fraternity before coming to the University of Oklahoma, and became a member of Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity at O. U. He and Elmer Capshaw installed Quo Vadis at the University.


Dr. Rose was head of the department of radiology of Rush Medical College of the University of Chicago, her title being associate clinical professor of surgery (radiology). She has studied X-ray developments in Europe, taking a course of lectures on this subject in Vienna, and has attended many international X-ray conferences.

In 1934, she became a diplomate of the American Board of Radiology, has been called upon frequently to address professional meetings, and is the author of 13 articles on subjects pertaining to X-ray for professional journals. #### Pinky Tomlin on radio

Oklahoma's Pinky Tomlin, '34ex, who has soared to quick success in the movies but nearly went on the rocks in a disastrous personal appearance tour, is staging

a "comeback" via radio as a result of signing a contract with Eddie Cantor's nationally broadcast Texaco program.

Tomlin first appeared on the Cantor program last spring, as a guest artist, singing his own composition, "Love Bug." Cantor became interested in the lanky Oklahoma composer-singer-actor and signed him up for a long-term contract. "Love Bug," incidentally, was the nation's second choice for two weeks in the Lucky Strike Hit-of-the-Week program, and was one of the choices for ten straight weeks.

According to Marjorie Newbern, '35, Oklahoma City newspaper reporter who interviewed Tomlin in Hollywood recently, the actor blames ill-advised billing for the "flop" he staged at Chicago.

"The build-up was all wrong," Tomlin told Miss Newbern. "They plastered my name everywhere as a 'handsome movie actor' instead of simply billing me as a red-faced farm boy from Oklahoma."

The long-term radio contract has made Tomlin feel that "for the first time since I've been in radio and screenwork, I have my feet on the ground," he told Miss Newbern.

Tomlin recently acquired a 11-acre ranch in North Hollywood, which adjoins one owned by Robert Taylor.
