Sooners at Home and Abroad

EON C. "RED" PHILLIPS, graduate of the University School of Law in 1916, appears destined to be the first O. U. alumnus to serve as governor of Oklahoma.

Mr. Phillips won the Democratic nomination for governor in the July primary election, and barring most unlikely shifts in the political situation, will be the winner in the general election in November.


Mr. Phillips is a former Sooner football star, member of Sigma Nu social fraternity, winner of the Letzeiser medal, president of the Student Council and member of Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity as well as many other student organizations. He is a successful attorney, served in the last three sessions of the Legislature and was speaker of the House in 1935.

Mrs. Phillips (Myrtle Ellenberger, '12) is also an O. U. graduate and will be the first Sooner alumna to preside in the governor's mansion.

University of Oklahoma graduates or former students also won nominations for state attorney general, for state superintendent of public instruction, and for three positions on the State Supreme Court.

Mac Q. Williamson, '10ex, was renominated for state attorney general. A. L. Crable, '27ma, is the Democratic nominee for state superintendent of public instruction.

Monroe Osborn, '04ex, won his race for renomination for the State Supreme Court, and Denver Davison, '15law, who was appointed to the Supreme Court to fill a vacancy won his first race for nomination to the position. Mr. Davison was stricken with appendicitis only a week be-

fore the election and completed his successful campaign by broadcasting a radio appeal from his hospital bed.

Earl Welch, '11ex, was unopposed for the third Supreme Court position to be filled this year, and also faces no opposition in the general election.

Mike Monroney, '24, Oklahoma City furniture dealer and former president of the University of Oklahoma Association, won a spirited race for the Democratic nomination for fifth district congressman. Although an experienced business man and newspaper man, he had had no previous experience in politics until last year when he entered the special election to fill a vacancy in the office of fifth district representative and ran third. He won the July primary by a large majority.

Three other Sooners won races for renomination for seats in Congress. They are Wilburn Cartwright, '20 law, McAlester, Third District; Jed Johnson, '18ex,, Anadarko, Sixth District; and Will Rogers, '30ms.ed, Oklahoma City, at-large.

Lewis Morris, '15law Oklahoma City won renomination for the important position as county attorney of Oklahoma County. He is a former president of the Alumni Association.

Dixie Gilmer, '24, was nominated for county attorney at Tulsa.

District judge nominations in Oklahoma County were won by Ben Arnold, '20, '25law; George Giddings, '14ex; Frank P. Douglass, '16law, and Clarence Mills, '23law.

Charles W. Conner, '24ex, won the nomination for judge of the Court of Common Pleas, Oklahoma City, and Ethel F. Dowell, '28ex, was nominated for county superintendent in Oklahoma County.

Noting the results in the legislative races—and particularly the high mortality rate among members of the last Legislature seeking re-election the *Daily Oklahoman* remarked editorially: "Most of the legislators who specialized in fighting Oklahoma University now have two years of leisure to find something else to specialize in."

Returns on legislative races over the state showed that more than thirty University of Oklahoma alumni or former students were nominated for the House of Representatives. The Sooners winning Democratic nominations for the House, according to preliminary survey include:

The recommendations were made by Charles Dierker, new federal district attorney for the western district of Oklahoma.

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
