WHAT THE INSTITUTE IS

Designed to survey the main currents of world politics today, this Institute offers one of the first programs of its kind ever to be conducted in the Southwest. Through a period of ten days, a faculty of qualified experts on international problems will present lectures and conduct round-tables in which the fundamental forces underlying the major movements dominating world affairs will be analyzed. The faculty includes recognized authorities from the United States, Europe, and Latin America—many of world reputation.

With wars being waged and with dictators taking fresh encouragement from each new diplomatic triumph, it behooves intelligent Americans to equip themselves with accurate and authoritative information, so that their discussions and actions as citizens in the world's largest democracy may be based on a sound knowledge of the facts.

One of the particularly valuable features of the Institute is the opportunity it will afford for free exchange of ideas between those attending and the faculty of visiting experts—an opportunity provided by the round tables operated on the forum basis, which will be held each morning following the formal evening lectures. Further study of related issues will be carried on in the afternoon seminars, to be conducted by members of the regular faculty of the University of Oklahoma.

Planned to direct attention to the regions of the world of particular significance to the contemporary scene in international politics, the program will cover subjects regarding Europe, Latin America, and the Far East, with one topic on "Education and World Politics." To synthesize the program as a whole the Institute will close with discussions of the general economic and political bases of world peace, and the bearing of these problems on American foreign policy.

MEMBERSHIP

While the work of the Institute is open to anyone who wishes to attend, a special invitation is extended to those in positions of leadership in their communities, such as teachers, students, business men, ministers, social workers, and members of civic clubs and women's organizations. It is anticipated that some of the membership will be recruited from the student body of the summer session, but member-

ship is by no means limited to this group. On the contrary, the work of the Institute has been planned especially for adult civic leaders who have no particular interest in securing academic credit, but whose chief motive in attending is to obtain a sound background for the discussion of world affairs. Emphasis is placed also on work which will prove profitable to high school teachers of history, civics, and problems in democracy, who wish to bring their equipment in the international aspects of these fields up to date.

ENROLLMENT

Enrollment is open all men and women who have an interest in the problems of international affairs. There is no charge for enrollment unless the participant wishes to receive academic credit for the work performed in the credit seminar.

ACADEMIC CREDIT

Those participants in the Institute who wish to receive academic credit for attendance should enroll in the seminar to be conducted by Dr. R. J. Dangerfield. Arrangements may be made for from two or three hours credit in the University. Charges for this credit will be on the same basis as for any other credit work done at the University, and must be handled through the offices of the University Treasurer and Registrar. There is no extra charge to those already enrolled in the University Summer Session. Communications regarding credit work should be addressed to Dr. Cortez A. M.
