KEADERS of the magazine should know better some of the prominent women of the faculty. We introduce this month Dr. Helen Brown Burton, professor of home economics and director of the School of Home Economics. She heads a faculty composed wholly of women, twelve in all. Dr. Burton has been director of the School of Home Economics since 1927. The school is located in Old Science Hall, but hopes to have a building of its own some day.

Dr. Milton Hopkins, assistant professor of botany in the University, is writing a weekly article, "Rambling with an Oklahoma Naturalist," for state newspapers.

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Professor Joseph R. Taylor, granted a year's leave, has returned to New York after two months' travel in Europe. Because of war conditions, he will spend the remainder of the year in New York in art study. Mrs. Taylor is with him.

The University Symphony Orchestra opened its thirty-seventh season November 14 in Holmberg Hall auditorium under the direction of Paul S. Carpenter, head of the department of stringed instruments. Barre Hill, head of the voice department, Miss Wilda Griffin, assistant professor of voice, and Herman Larson, assistant professor of voice, assisted in this opening concert.

Two instructors have been appointed by the English department to finish out the year in the place of Dr. B. A. Botkin, now on leave. They are Paul Schmidt, formerly professor of English at North Dakota State Normal College, who has been named special instructor in English, and Miss Sarah Graham, instructor last year in the Junior College at Tonkawa. Mr. Schmidt has his master's degree from Chicago, and Miss Graham has a master's degree from the University of Pittsburgh. Dr. Botkin, known to many alumni as editor of Folk-Say, took leave to re-assume editorship of the WPA writers' program, at Washington, D.C.

Dr. Moor is chairman of the committee on student health for the O.U, medical school.
