# Veteran superintendent dies

E. L. Rodman, '28ma, superintendent of schools at Antlers for the last twenty-six years, died suddenly May 17 in his hotel room at Antlers.

Mr. Rodman, a bachelor, was 55 years old. He served as member of the State Board of Education in the Holloway and Marland administrations, and was a member of the State Textbook Commission for a time.

From 1914 to 1924, Mr. Rodman taught in the summer sessions of the Southeastern State Teachers College at Durant, and became widely acquainted with teachers over the state. He had served as member of the board of directors of the Oklahoma Education Association.

# O. U. Press loses artist

P. J. Conkwright, '38ma, art editor of the University of Oklahoma Press, has resigned to accept a similar position at the Princeton University Press, Princeton, New Jersey.
