**D**R. JAMES F. FINDLAY, dean of men, was elected president of the National Association of Deans and Advisors of Men at the annual meeting held in Roanoke, Virginia. He presented a paper on the functions of deans and advisors of men, giving the results of a national survey.

Dean Findlay has received national attention for his pioneer work in organizing non-fraternity men students.
