Mrs. Perry has received wide recognition as founder and editor of *Cooperative Books*, a pamphlet publishing venture covering varied subjects. She is also author of syndicated articles on child education and numerous critical and historical articles on the theater, and has collaborated on two textbooks in college English. An instructor in English at the University during the twenties, she has served as state secretary of the American Association of University Women and president of Oklahoma Alumnae of Alpha Phi.

National attention has been attracted to the program of the O.U. Extension Division under Mr. Scott's direction. Besides addressing such groups as the American Library Association, the National University Extension Association and numerous state organizations, he has written articles for educational journals and prepared a series of radio articles used in a national weekly broadcast for a year.

A practicing attorney and civic leader, Mr. Kulp has been a director of the Oklahoma City Junior Chamber of Commerce, chairman of the Youth Welfare Committee of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, president of the State Oil Jobbers Association and member of the State Advisory Council of the University of Oklahoma Association. His special interest has been in juvenile welfare and juvenile delinquency, on which he has written a number of articles.

Mr. DeGolyer, known for the introduction of geophysics into oil discovery, has recently been made distinguished professor of geology at the University of Texas. A consulting geologist by profession, he received the Anthony F. Lucas gold medal for 1940 for outstanding work in oil production and discovery. He has written more than seventy-five technical articles and has spoken to innumerable professional meetings.


