## Message to expedition

To Arnold Court, '34, only Sooner alumnus on the Byrd Antarctic Expedition, went a special message from the O. U. Alumni Office the night of December 7, via short wave radio service of the General Electric Company at Schenectady.

The message, signed by Alumni Secre-

tary Ted Beaird, read:
"To the Honorable Arnold Court,
Chairman University of Oklahoma Alumni Advisory Council South Pole (This

Chairman University of Oklahoma Alumni Advisory Council, South Pole (This World), en route: On behalf of the 75,000 alumni and former students of the University of Oklahoma, may we wish you bon voyage en route to the land of the penguins. We may be unable, in trying hours, to twist the Missouri Tigers' tails and to husk the Nebraska Cornhuskers, BUT we know the penguins of the South Pole will appreciate Sooner lore and tradition on your arrival."

The message was made possible by a special weekly service offered by the radio station to transmit short messages from families and friends of members of the

expedition.
