DR. BENJAMIN A. BOTKIN, associate professor of English, who has been on leave of absence most of the time during the last three years, has resigned permanently in order to continue work as director of the National W. P. A. Folklore Project in Washington, D. C. Dr. Botkin joined the University faculty in 1931 and soon become widely known as an authority on folklore. Some of the folklore material he collected was published by the University of Oklahoma Press under the title *Folk-Say*.

The University Board of Regents at its June meeting granted an additional leave of absence and made two promotions. Albert A. Sutton, assistant professor of journalism, was granted a one-year leave of absence to complete work for a doctor's degree in journalism at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois. Dr. Findley Weaver was promoted from associate professor to professor of marketing, and Carl Ritzman, now on leave, was promoted from instructor to assistant professor of speech.

For the last four years Dr. Brown has been director of the Oklahoma Disciples Foundation, an organization sponsoring religious work among Christian Church students on the O. U. campus. He also sponsored the organization of a weekly interdenominational gathering of students in the Union Building for religious programs.
