URING the last year the University and Crippled Children's Hospitals have acquired three Drinker Respirators. The hospital purchased an adult Drinker Respirator, an infant Drinker Respirator, and a General-Collins Emergency Lung. An orthopedic model of Drinker Respriator was received as a gift from the Oklahoma County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc. This gift was made possible through the "March of Dimes Campaign" carried out in Oklahoma County last year.

Among the improvements introduced at the University and Crippled Children's Hospitals are: air conditioning of the newborn nursery, remodeling and air conditioning of infants' nursery at the Crippled Children's Hospital, and installation of individual cubicles of steel and glass for each crib, and the establishment of a pre-

mature nursery.
