With the Armed Forces

Four Oklahoma fliers, whose aerial exploits have been headline news since Pearl Harbor, came home from the Pacific battlefront this fall to find themselves hailed with tremendous ovations everywhere they went. Proud home folks welcomed Maj. John L. Smith, '36bus, Lexington; Capt. Nathan Blanton, '36-'38, Shawnee; Capt. James Bruce Morehead, '38, Washington, Oklahoma, and Capt. Andy Reynolds, '40, Seminole.

Major Smith, Marine pilot who according to last reports was the highest ranking ace of the Solomons, arrived in Lexington October 30 escorted by the Oklahoma highway patrol, to be greeted by cheering townspeople. Schools turned out and business houses closed their doors as a public welcoming ceremony was held. Major Smith hurried on to Washington, D. C., after a brief visit with friends and relatives in Lexington and Norman. He was scheduled to appear on the Kate Smith radio program November 13.

Captain Blanton, who holds the Silver Star and the Oak Leaf Cluster, visited the campus October 22 in the company of William Wehrend, director of the University band. Captain Blanton was a drum major with the band during his student days.

Captain Morehead, an ace with at least seven Japanese planes to his credit, arrived home wearing a black tie, contrary to uniform regulations, but explained that where he's from clothes are scarce, and the men wear whatever they can get. He added, "Sometimes we don't even wear pants because you can't see through one of those heavy flying suits." Captain Morehead got in some good hunting and fishing in the McClain County woods and fields while at home.

Captain Reynolds now holds an assortment of awards including two Silver Stars, the Oak Leaf Cluster, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Purple Heart. On his way home he stopped off at the Fiji Islands to buy a silver necklace for his wife. He spent several days in Seminole and attended the Kansas State game November 7 in Norman.

"We're going to win," Major Smith declared. "I have never doubted that. The Japanese are excellent fighters. They fly good planes, but they lack the proper thinking process to analyze a situation. They plunge into any fight, often losing planes and pilots unnecessarily."

Captain Reynolds commented, "The Japanese are fighting by compulsion, and they don't seem to have their hearts in it. We Americans have something to fight for, and I think that makes a big difference.' ➤ On foreign service in England for almost a year, Lt. Howard Hively, '37-'40, Omar, West Virginia, piloted a plane in

the Dieppe raid and in other Allied aerial attacks on Nazi European strongholds. Relatives have gathered from best accounts that Lieutenant Hively now has several German planes to his credit. He wrote his father that he hit several enemy craft at Dieppe but didn't have time to see them fall, that he knew the coast of France as well as his home town. Lieutenant Hively was a pilot in the American Eagle Squadron of the Royal Air Force before his transfer along with other American pilots to U. S. service.

Lt. U. S. (Sid) O'Hern, '41ba, has been mentioned in recent Associated Press dispatches from Australia as one of two bomber pilots who shot down two Zeros and scored a direct hit on a Japanese transport ship in the south Pacific. The action occurred during the contest over Guadalcanal. Lieutenant O'Hern is a native of Kingfisher County, having lived in King-

fisher, Dover and Hennessey.

Lt. Paul Irving Williams, '39, Norman, piloted one of the Flying Fortresses which raided Japanese bases in the Solomon Islands to ease enemy pressure on U. S. forces fighting on Guadalcanal in mid-October. Flying in unfavorable weather against one of the heaviest Anti-aircraft barrages ever put up by the enemy, the American pilots bombed a group of enemy vessels at Buin and reported a number of direct hits. Lieutenant Williams, former fine arts student in the University, was known as Irving while attending O. U.

► Lt. Earl H. Grimes, '14-'19, Norman, died November 8 in the hospital at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana, following a long illness. He enlisted in the Army Air Force last June and was on duty at A.A.F. Headquarters in Chicago when he became

of Cleveland.

Lt. Troy M. Bibb, '39-'41, Oklahoma City, was killed in a crash of an Army airplane near the Muroc Air Base in California late in October. Lieutenant Bibb, whose home was originally in Summers, Arkansas, graduated from high school in Pawhuska. He was a drama student while attending the University and participated in the Civilian Pilot Training program at O. U. Survivors include his father, W. V. Bibb, of Summers, four brothers and a sister.

► Lt. Wayne Turk, '33-'35, Enid, was killed recently by an accidental shell explosion at his station somewhere in Australia. Lieutenant Turk was stationed at Fort Sill and various California camps before going on overseas duty. While attending the University he was a member of Scabbard and Blade and Phi Delta Theta fraternity. His parents are Mr. and Mrs.

J. E. Turk of Enid.

➤ Lt. W. T. (T-Bone) Howell, '39speech, has been reported missing in action in the Philippine Islands since last May. Lieutenant Howell, whose home while attending the University was Butler, was with the heavy Field Artillery in the defense of the Islands. He was a member of Thalian reading society, Bombardiers, the men's choral reading group, Eta Sigma Phi, honorary classical languages fraternity, and the "O" club with a letter in track. He was chosen outstanding non-commissioned officer in R.O.T.C. in 1935 and outstanding first sergeant in 1936.

Fred Waring's radio program October 22 paid coast-to-coast homage to Carl Dalbey, Jr., '40, Oklahoma City, who spent 32 days floating in an open boat on the Atlantic after his Merchant Marine ship was torpedoed and sunk. His mother, Mrs. Carl Dalbey, Sr., went to New York to appear as Mr. Waring's guest on the program and wish her son, somewhere at sea, birthday greetings on his twenty-first birthday. In tribute to Mr. Dalbey and the Merchant Marine Mr. Waring said, "No nation made up of boys like Carl Dalbey will ever lose a war." The Sooner hero returned to service with the Merchant Marine after seven weeks spent at home to regain his strength.

Lt. David Obert, '40, who was with the American forces in the Philippines, was reported at his home near Apache recuperating from tropical fever contracted while fighting on Bataan. He was notified by the War Department that Mrs. Obert, the former Dorothy Ellis of Chicago, was probably interned at Santo Tomas University in Manila. She was with her husband in the Philippines at the outbreak of hostilities and was left behind when General MacArthur evacuated Manila. She was believed to be interned with other Americans cap-

tured at Manila.

Seaman Bill E. Geyer, '39-'40, who came to Norman on leave late in October, was among survivors of the *U.S.S. Gregory* which was sunk near Guadalcanal by the Japanese. He floated on a life belt for four and a half hours before Marines from the Island rescued him from the ocean. The first thought after the Gregory started sinking was to abandon ship in order to escape enemy machine gun fire, Seaman Geyer said. He returned to the west coast for new Navy orders in November.

David John Osmond, '36-'39, Gotebo, graduated as honor man of his company at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station in Illinois in October. Former employee at the Lockheed Aircraft Company plant in Burbank, California, Mr. Osmond was selected to attend the Navy school after tak-

ing a series of aptitude tests.

In an impressive ceremony held before the flag-draped Municipal auditorium in Shawnee, Maj. A. L. Johnson, base adjutant of Will Rogers Field, pinned the Distinguished Service Cross on the father of Lt. Garrett H. McCallister, '39.

The university alumnus, who was reported missing in the battle of Midway

June 4, 1942, was cited for extraordinary heroism in action. He was co-pilot of a bomber.

The air hero's father, Mark E. McCallister, received the award on October 24, the anniversary of the birth of his son, who would have been 24 years old on that day.

Despite the military formality of the occasion, the actual ceremony was simple and brief, with a sincerity that deeply touched the 1,500 spectators who turned out to honor one of Shawnee's war heroes.

Martial music was provided by the Will Rogers Field band under the direction of Warrant Officer Harry Holloway and two platoons from the air school added a military note with precise drilling review.

The celebration was marked by the flying of flags throughout the day on all public buildings and Shawnee streets, and Mayor G. A. Malsbury issued a proclamation ordering all stores, offices and business houses to close during the half-hour program.

Station KGFF of Shawnee carried a special broadcast of the event, and the ceremany was broadcast in other parts of the state over the Oklahoma network.

Citation accompanying the Distinguished Service Cross was as follows:

"Garrett H. McCallister, second lieutenant, 18th Reconnaissance Squadron (M) AAF, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in action near Midway Island, June 4, 1942. Lieutenant McCallister, as co-pilot of a medium bombardment airplane, displayed extraordinary heroism during a torpedo-bombing mission against

the Japanese navy. The success of the mission was dependent entirely upon the skill, courageousness and unfaltering devotion to duty of the crew members of the airplanes participating, who unhesitatingly entered into the attack at great personal risk to their own lives in the face of concentrated gunfire of the Japanese naval forces and fighter planes. During this, the first torpedo attack ever carried out by the Army Air Forces, the airplane on which Lieutenant McCallister was co-pilot was lost. Entered Military service from Oklahoma."

OKLAHOMA 14, IOWA STATE 7

This game was more remarkable for the strenuous travel conditions war-time transportation imposed upon the Sooners rather than for its football, although the Oklahoma coaches had high praise upon their return for Iowa State's speedy sweeps and for Paul Darling and Royal Lohry, Cyclone backs.

Unable to secure pullmans, Oklahoma rode a chair car from Norman, to Des Moines, Iowa, the Sooner players spending all of Thursday night trying to sleep in the aisles or across the seats. However after a sound rest Friday night the Oklahoma team was ready.

The Sooners sped into a 14-0 lead at the half. Hamm passed to Baker for one touchdown and Davis drove over guard for another. Hamm kicked both goals. The Sooners didn't show much offense, setting up both touchdown opportunities with bristling defensive play, Bill Campbell recovering a Cyclone fumble in midfield and Center Jack Marsee intercepting an Iowa State pass to give Oklahoma the ball before each scoring drive.

Iowa State's game squad carried the fight to Oklahoma in the third quarter, scoring a touchdown on Lohry's buck after an Oklahoma penalty moved the ball to the Oklahoma one-yard line, but the Sooners rallied in the fourth quarter, most of which was played in Ames territory.

Another oddity that set this game apart was the aggressive Oklahoma team's feat of piling Cyclone backs for the record total of 102 yards in losses. End Jim Tyree was the defensive lion of the Sooners although End Dub Lamb and Guard George Gibbons gave him yeoman help with the pass rushing.

"We were 50 percent improved against Oklahoma in every department of play except pass protection," Mike Michalske of Iowa State later declared. "At the half I thought we would surely win. But our passer never had a chance to throw the ball and we couldn't run without a passing threat."

OKLAHOMA 76, KANSAS STATE 0

This overwhelming score was somewhat similar to Oklahoma's 80-0 drubbing of Henry Kendall College back in 1917, during the last World War; it would never have happened in a normal year. Many of Kansas State's players and Coaches Hobbs Adams, Bill Schutte and Jack Gardner are in the armed forces. The Sooners have also sent 22 of last year's lettermen to the nation's war effort but obviously had more playing strength left than did the Wildcats.

Coach Luster tried every means at his command to keep the score down but in vain. He withdrew the Oklahoma first team after 14 minutes of play in the first quarter when the Sooners led 14-0, and never sent them back. Meanwhile the Oklahoma reserves, starved for a chance to play after sitting on the bench all season, turned the game into a shambles, scoring 41 points in the last quarter alone.

Kansas State contributed to her own downfall in this hectic period by always electing to receive the kickoff, then fumbling or forward-passing it squarely into Oklahoma's hands on the first succeeding play deep in Kansas State territory.

(9) Wright reversed 28 yards to a touchdown, Shanks goaling. 63-0.

(10) Neher intercepted a Kansas State pass and ran 54 yards to a touchdown. Shanks goaled but Oklahoma held, and from their 17-yard line, the Sooners elected to try to pass for the point, Kansas State intercepting. 69-0.
