1908 Frank M. Long, '08ba, '09ma, has resigned as head of the Young Men's Christian Association in Roanoke, Virginia, to organize and set in motion a new United Service Organizations project in Dublin, Virginia. Although he was well into his Y.M.C.A. work for the year when he was urgently asked to take over the U.S.O. project, he resigned from the Y.M.C.A. post and two days later was on the job in Dublin. that the tough fibrous sisal plant, considered as a weed and practically worthless in that vicinity, could be transformed into a variety of products such as belts, purses, sandals, rugs, cotton-bale covers and clothes brushes. They first organized workers' co-operatives and later, as the natives became convinced of the sisal plant's possibilities, they instituted medical co-operatives, libraries, nurseries, drama clubs and playgrounds.

Mr. Neff was admitted to the Oklahoma Bar in 1930 and was appointed by Governor Phillips to the Supreme Court in 1940 to fill an unexpired term. For the last two years he had been engaged in private law practice. Survivors include his mother, of Oklahoma City, and eight sisters.

Mrs. Velma Davie Kerr, '29-'30, Oklahoma City, was killed July 4 in a car crash-explosion and fire which occurred at a heavy traffic intersection in Oklahoma City and was fatal for four persons. She was 32 years old. Mrs. Kerr and a friend were returning to Oklahoma City from a political rally when their car collided near a filling station with an automobile driven by Marshall LaDay, 28-year-old Negro. A gas pump struck in the collision ignited and Mrs. Kerr and her friend were trapped in the flames. Survivors include her husband, B. B. Kerr, '31law, representative in the Oklahoma Legislature from Oklahoma County and brother of Robert S. Kerr, '16, Democratic nominee for governor of Oklahoma; her mother, Mrs. Ruth Davie, Tulsa; and two brothers, Earl Davie, '31law, of Many, Louisiana, and M. E. Davie, Borger, Texas.

William L. Ducker, 69 years old, Tecumseh attorney and court reporter, died June 23 in Fort Worth, Texas, where he had gone for medical treatment after a short illness. A resident of Tecumseh since 1907, Mr. Ducker was a member of the Oklahoma Bar Association and a graduate of the University of Nebraska. He was the father of W. L. 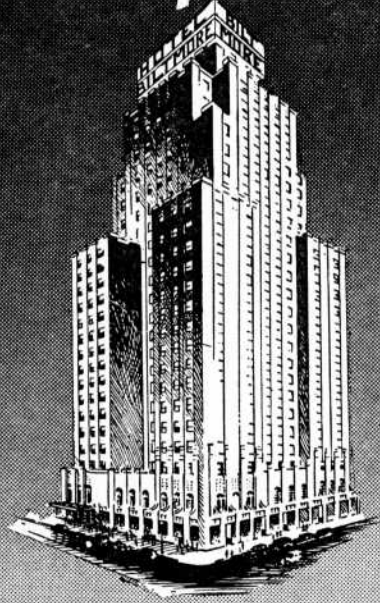

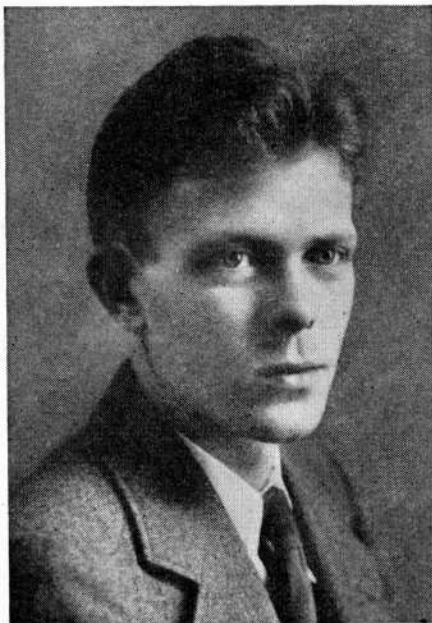

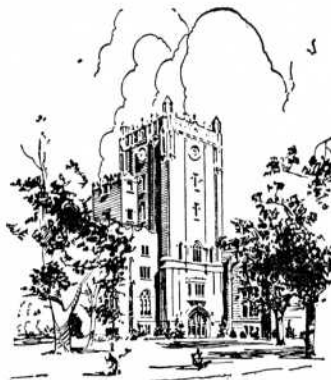

Economic planning to make the waging of war physically difficult and undesirable is more likely to prevent war than political integration methods, John A. Griswold, chairman of the University's department of finance, contended.

He proposed that after the war an American "World Production Board" control reconstruction of devastated industrial areas by apportioning American machinery and raw materials on a basis of comparative advantage—the principle of having each producing area specialize in the economic goods which it is best fitted to produce. Mr. Griswold suggested that after such industries were once established and operating, the board could go out of existence and give free play to individual initiative and enterprise.
