During the last two months, alumni payments on Life Memberships have provided \$600 in cash which has been turned over to the Life Membership Fund Trustees for the purchase of war savings bonds. The trustees in January purchased \$2,500 worth of the bonds with funds on hand, and announced that all payments made on Life Memberships for the next six months—either on new memberships or in payment of previous pledges—would be used to buy war savings bonds as a contribution of the Alumni Association toward the nation's war effort.

A Life Membership costs \$60, which may be paid at the rate of a \$5 initial payment and a \$5 instalment each quarter until the total is paid. A single Life Membership includes both husband and wife, if both attended the University, and includes a life subscription to Sooner Magazine.
