# With the Armed Forces

University Alumni serving with American forces on all battlefronts continued to make headline news last month. Five rereceived decorations.

► High honor was paid posthumously to Lt. Duane J. Clapham, '38bus, Norman, when he was awarded China's Meritorious Medal of the Army, Navy and Air Forces, First Grade, A Class, by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek. Lieutenant Clapham was killed April 17, 1942 when the plane he was testing crashed in India. He could have saved his life by parachuting to safety, but chose to remain in the plane to keep it from crashing into a crowd of people.

For services rendered over, above and beyond the line of duty, in total disregard of his own personal safety, Lt. Thirl E. Jarrett, '36med, received the Navy Cross last November 9. On the nights of October 13, 14, 15 and 17, Lieutenant Jarrett cared for wounded men on Guadalcanal under heavy Naval gun fire from the enemy. His work consisted largely of administering blood plasma to the wounded. Lieutenant Jarrett, formerly a physician in New York and Norfolk, Virginia, is a member of the Navy Medical Corps attached to a Marine unit.

► Capt. Paul Irving Williams, '34-'39, Norman, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement in South Pacific aerial combat. Captain Williams, who already held the Silver Star, was one of 42 officers and men given the medal at the same time.

► Lt. Lester T. Mooney, '41, Norman, has been decorated with the Silver Star for gallantry in action near Buna Village on New Guinea. Lieutenant Mooney is attached to an Infantry company. The dispatch announcing the presentation of the award, datelined Washington, February 8, carried no details.

Lt. (jg) Carl E. Carmichael, '34-'37, Hobart, has been awarded the Air Medal for his actions in the Aleutian Islands. He, along with eleven other Navy Fliers, has been engaged in patrol missions and bombing raids against the Japanese in the Islands despite severe weather conditions

and determined enemy resistance.

Lt. Samuel A. Ray, '4leng, Oklahoma City, was killed recently in an airplane collision over Leicestershire, England. He had been stationed in England with the Army Air Force since last November. Before leaving this country he was on duty at Randolph Field, Texas and Drew Field, Florida. In civilian life Lieutenant Ray was a geologist with the Pure Oil Company in Fort Worth, Texas. While attending the University he was a member of Phi Eta

and the Geological Engineers Club.

Lt. Paul M. Pitts, '39-'41, Poteau, was killed February 2 in the crash of an Army bomber near Bedford, Virginia. The plane was from the Army Air Base at Columbia, South Carolina, where Lieutenant Pitts, a pilot, was stationed. While attending the University he was a student in the College of Engineering and participated in intramural sports.

Lt. Randolph V. Donalson, '38-'41, Hollis, was killed last month when two Army medium bombers crashed near Newberry, South Carolina. Both planes were from the Greenville, South Carolina, Army Air Base. Officials were investigating reports that they collided in midair. Lieutenant Donalson was a navigator for one of the planes. While at the University he was a student in the College of Business Administration, member of the band, and an intramural debater. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Donalson of Hollis.

► Word has been received that Lt. Dan Burns, '38-'40, Albuquerque, New Mexico, has been missing in action since March, 1942. An Army Air Force pilot, he was stationed in Hawaii and failed to return from a flight. Lieutenant Burns received his wings at Coral Gables, Florida. He was a student in the College of Engineering and a member of Sigma Chi fraternity.

► Lt. George T. Holland, '39eng, Mount Pleasant, Texas, has been officially re-

ported missing in action. He was with an Ordnance company at Fort Stotsenburg when war started and has not been heard from since the fall of Bataan. Before entering the Army Lieutenant Holland was employed as assistant test engineer with the Atlantic Refining Company in Longview, Texas. At the University he was a member of Scabbard and Blade, Sigma Tau engineering fraternity, Ruf Neks, and St. Pat's Council.

Lt. Wayne W. Christian, '39ba, member of the U. S. Marine Corps, was reported missing in action. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne B. Christian of Oklahoma City, received the notification early last month. Lieutenant Christian was commissioned in the Marine Air Corps on March 3, 1942, at the Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi, Texas. While training there he specialized in flying fast fighter planes, the type used on carriers. Before entering the service Lieutenant Christian was a salesman with the L. C. Smith and Corona Typewriter Company in Houston, Texas. He was a member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity.

► Capt. Steve Masoero, '39eng, Henryetta, has been officially listed as missing in action by the War Department. No word has been heard from him since the fall of Bataan in May, 1942. Captain Masoero was stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona before going overseas. In civilian life he was employed by several oil companies, among them the Atlantic Pipeline Company of Dallas and the Shell Oil Company at Denver City, Texas.

Lt. Marvin H. Bryant, '37-'40, Hugo, has been missing in action since January 18, according to War Department notice received by his mother, Mrs. Maud Bryant of Hugo. Lieutenant Bryant, who received the Distinguished Service Cross last October for gallantry in action, was stationed in Alaska and the Aleutian Islands. At the University he was an anthropology major and a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity.

►Lt. Leonard C. B. Jenks, '36ed, Oklahoma City, was reported a prisoner of war at a Japanese prison camp in the Philippine Islands. Lieutenant Jenks was a Civilian Conservation Corps officer until he entered the regular Army in 1941. He was sent to the Philippines in August of

that year.

► Cadet Jack Riley, '36-'40, Sayre, was injured recently when he bailed out of his training plane which had gone into a spin near Minter Field, California, where he was stationed. He sprained both ankles and received lacerations and bruises in a parachute landing. Cadet Riley was third baseman on the Sooner baseball team in '38, '39 and '40, with one of the best bat-

ting averages in the Big Six.

► In a large scale aerial combat over Wau, New Guinea early last month two alumni shot down a Japanese plane apiece. They were Lt. Don Sutliff, '40, Blackwell, and Lt. Dugan Woodring, '36-'38, Noble. The action, centering around the Wau airdrome, was termed by correspondents "one of the most crushing air defeats yet inflicted by the Allies in this area."

► Associated Press dispatches from the battlefront in southern Tunisia mention two alumni, Maj. E. H. Burba, '33bus, McAlester, and Lt. Field Duskin, '37-'41, Oklahoma City. Major Burba, a battalion commander, explained the system of fire to the AP correspondent as German guns bombarded American tanks and infantrymen waited to push forward. When a shell burst on a hill behind the party, seemingly unnoticed by the officers, the reporter asked Lieutenant Duskin where it came from and received the casual reply, "It's probably a German 88 trying to get our range."

Four sons of the Walter Northcutt family of Lexington are members of the armed services on active duty, and a fifth, enrolled in the University and a member of the Army Air Force Reserve, expected last month to be called at any time. Those on duty are Capt. Clarence D. Northcutt, '38law, Camp Bowie, Texas; O. V. Northcutt, '37-'41, printer second class at White Plains, New York; Cadet B. C. Northcutt, '39-'42, with the Naval Air Corps at Athens, Georgia, and Cadet Carol R. Northcutt, '38-'39, Moore Field, Texas. The youngest son, Nathal, is a freshman in

the University College.

Four days spent in the ice and snow of a Newfoundland wilderness clearing, without food or definite assurance of rescue, were described by Sgt. Philip G. Bockman, '39-'40, Oklahoma City, member of the Royal Canadian Air Force fighter squadron, after his return to civilization. Sergeant Bockman was forced down by bad weather and a gasoline shortage, but radioed his position before his battery went dead. Before help came four days later, he existed on snow and kept warm by wrapping up in his parachute. On the fourth day a searching plane spotted him. "It circled and dropped me everything except a blond," said Sergeant Bockman, recuperating in a Canadian hospital. "Most important of my gifts from the sky was some hot tomato soup. I just sat me down and had a real feed." Later a plane came back to pick him up.

From somewhere in New Guinea came word through AP correspondents that Lt. George Shaffer, '35-'36, Bartlesville, and Capt. William Hoover, '38-'40, Altus, were taking a big part in action against enemy air fields and shipping. Lieutenant Shaffer piloted a Liberator

bomber which recently sank a Japanese cargo ship off the north New Britain coast. "We skip-bombed her," said Lieutenant Shaffer, "dropping two bombs at a time.... On the second run we hit her and she sank in three minutes." He also bombed the Gasmata runway. Captain Hoover was navigator of a Flying Fortress which led an attack on Rabaul early in February.

▶ Sgt. George Douglas Idlett, '38-'40, Snyder, is reported by the war department to be a prisoner of the Japanese in the Philippine Islands. Sergeant Idlett, who was a student in the College of Engineering at the University, was stationed at Nichols Field in the Philippines when war started.

Lt. Ray Lewis Hilliard, '38-'40, Hominy, was in a Royal Air Force hospital in Wales last month recuperating from an injury received January 3 in action on the western European air front. Lieutenant Hilliard is stationed in England with U. S. Army Air Forces.

#### Abroad

Doris Clay Robinson, '27-'28, WAAC auxiliary from Altus, is assigned as secretary in the office of General Eisenhower at Allied head-quarters in North Africa.

In a January 15 dispatch from Tel-Aviv, Palestine, A.P. Correspondent Paul Kern Lee told of going to a movie there with Capt. Jay E. Warner, '36bus, Oklahoma City. "I was accompanied by Capt. Jay E. Warner of Oklahoma City and several other Americans. We sat in the front row, balcony, and Warner said it felt like Oklahoma City." The movie, a year old, was presented with both French and Hebrew subtitles. Mr. Lee said Tel-Aviv, where he had "the feeling of being not too far from home in a spot much resembling a New York City suburb," is a favorite gathering place for American soldiers on leave.

Hens eggs are almost as scarce as hen's teeth in North Africa, writes Lt. Fred Palmblad, '38 ba, Enid, now with the Signal Corps. Recently he and a fellow officer got hold of a couple of dozen by undisclosed means, found a quiet inconspicuous corner and ate a dozen apiece. Lieutenant Palmblad, formerly associated with radio station KCRC in Enid, wrote his mother about the episode, whereupon she recalled that he always had been able to cat six eggs at a time and that being in Africa had evidently doubled

his appetite.

Gratefulness for the package of Christmas gifts sent him by the Oklahoma City Red Cross chapter was expressed recently in a letter from Sgt. Malcolm McKenzie, Jr., '36eng, '37eng. "I drew a pad of stationery, a deck of playing cards, a package of cigarets, a package of gum, a fine pencil, a sewing kit, and some extra shoc laces," Sergeant McKenzie, who is on duty in North Africa, wrote.

As presents from home the soldier in North Africa likes shaving mirrors, soap, socks, shoe strings and such prosaic articles, according to Lt. P. M. Casady, '29ba, Oklahoma City, chaplain with U. S. forces there. The Army sup-

Smiff and eating tobacco are hard to get. The proportions were figured out for city slickers, not for good old country boys.'

The common people of North Africa are virtually destitute for want of food and clothing, according to a letter relatives received from Lt. Jack R. Hodge, '41bus, Oklahoma City. "When the axis was here they stripped the people of all they had. Clothes are in rags, tattered, misfits or anything they can wear... We have given our friends a few potatoes, some soap, tobacco and flour-the first they've had in years... For coffee they roast date seeds and grind them up. For soap they use a compound of fish skins and oil. Flour is unheard of, bread coming from anything they can get," he wrote.
