

Mr. Rodgers has turned out waltzes, love songs, comic songs and a title number which the state in question would do well to seize as an anthem forthwith . . . Possibly in addition to being a musical play, Oklahomal could be called a folk operetta; whatever it is, it is very good."

Among the numbers sung by the cast of cowboys, farmers and rural belles are Oh, What a Beautiful Morning, People Will Say, and The Surrey with the Fringe on Top.

#### WILBURN CARTWRIGHT, '20LAW

Wilburn Cartwright, '20law, former Oklahoma congressman from McAlester, is among over 600 handpicked civilian experts selected to attend a special Army school at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. The school was established to train men for future service as advisory specialists to military governors of conquered territory. Mr. Cartwright, who was a member of the House of Representatives in Washington for 16 years, holds a commission as major. 
# Watch for Announcement of the Complete 1943 Sooner Football Schedule
