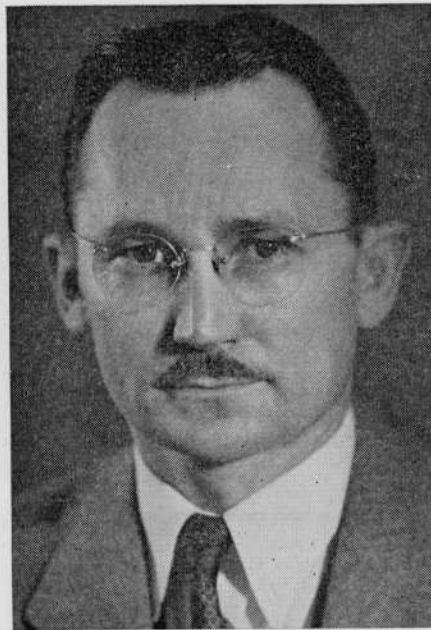
Rex McGehee, '30geol, geologist with the Shell Oil Company, has been transferred from Illinois to the company laboratory in Tulsa.

World Calendar Favored

Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii passed a resolution in April recommending that the Edwards Perpetual Calendar, devised by Willard E. Edwards, '29eng, be adopted by all nations at the peace conference following the war. The resolution requests that Congress propose to all nations appointment now of a national committee to study the calendar with a view towards its acceptance at the peace conference. Mr. Edwards, a navy lieutenant stationed in Hawaii, bases his calendar on a division of the 365-day year into 91-day quarters of three months each. The first two months of each quarter have 30 days and the third month has 31 days, with New Year's day an international holiday apart from any month or week. Since passage of the resolution, Mr. Edwards has received favorable comment about the calendar from public libraries in Los Angeles, San Diego, New York, Boston and the University of Southern California. Local radio station KGMB in Hawaii has carried explanations of the calendar.
