AFTER compiling last semester grades, the Registry Office announced that 67 students among those enrolled in at least 12 hours made straight A's. . . . James Blaine Davidson, sophomore chemical engineering student from Oklahoma City who was appointed by President Brandt to try out for entrance into the Naval Academy at Annapolis this spring, ranked tenth among all applicants taking the scholastic tests. Students who took the tests were all Naval R. O. T. C. trainees from the nation's universities. Still between Davidson and admittance to the Academy were the physical exams.

Campus organizations were busy collecting items for the armed forces in June. Mortar Board started a drive for phonograph records for a Texas Army post and Panhellenic asked for contributions to the national "Baubles for Barter" program, which will send old bits of costume jewelry to troops in the Pacific for use in winning the friendship and help of natives.

Word was received from a Navy official that 12,000 cigarets bought with contributions from the O. U. student body are being distributed to crews of ships departing from New York harbor. . . . Emil Kraettli, University secretary, has announced that loans will still be available to students next year under the Student War Loans Program. Up to now 60 students have received assistance from this fund, which is available to those who comply with certain specifications set up by the U. S. Office of Education.

Betty German, Arts and Sciences senior from Porter, was appointed successor to Army-bound Everett Berry as editor of the 1944 *Sooner Yearbook*. Holice Hoshall, Tulsa, sophomore journalism student, became the first girl ever to be employed as engraver on the *Oklahoma Daily*. She is continuing her work as *Daily* photographer.

Elmer G. Sprague, freshman from Clayton, reported to West Point Military Academy June 1 to begin training. At the University he was an N. R. O. T. C. trainee.

The Texas Oil Company of Tulsa recently gave the School of Geology 104 boxes of well samples to add to its growing sample collection. Geology students, consulting geologists and oil companies make frequent use of the samples. . . . Recent contributors of specimens to the Bebb Herbarium, the collection of the Botany Department, include New York State Museum, New York Botanical Gardens and a botanist now in the Army Medical Corps.
