DALE C. BYRD, senior architecture student from El Reno, won the highest possible award from the Beaux-Arts Institute of Design recently with a sketch, "A Fashion Show Room." The award was won in a nationwide contest which was entered by students of most of the large universities. The drawing was published in the Institute bulletin and will be exhibited in architecture schools all over the country.

Honor came also to senior architect Cecil D. Elliott, of Holdenville, for his design, "County Fair Grounds," entered in another Beaux-Arts competition. A member of the jury, Benjamin Smith, New York architect, called his plan "the best of the problems submitted."

Freshmen and sophomore men were temporarily free from drill and military classes as Service Command headquarters ordered suspension of R.O.T.C. activities during the eight-weeks term. The Hillel foundation is one of 30 similar organization on other campuses... Conversational Spanish is taught by W. E. Chapman, retired American foreign service officer who was stationed for 28 years in Spanish-speaking countries, in a special evening class of the Modern Languages Department.

A survey by Clifford Murphy, Y.M.C. A. secretary, showed that approximately half of Norman's Sunday church congregations are University students... After an absence of five years, Ira Y. Rice, Jr., editor of the *Christian Soldier* national religious journal, has returned to the University to complete work for a journalism degree. Since leaving the campus Mr. Rice has been active as a Church of Christ evangelist and editor of the *Christian Soldier*. He plans to open a book, Bible and church supply house in San Francisco after graduating in February.
