For such as he, the longest span of life is all too short.

It is doubtful that the State of Oklahoma will ever again be graced with a man with so many, such constant, and such firm friends as formed about Dr. Bizzell in a veritable host. He was

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loved. He will be revered; for the quality which stood Abou Ben Adhem in good stead will suffice

to save him from human detraction.

The chief motive of his life was to promote the welfare of mankind. This he sought through the proper guidance and growth of the thousands of Oklahoma youths who passed through the University. He loved the students; they loved him. He was their friend as well as their philosopher and guide. The moral, intellectual and spiritual boons he conferred in such abundance during his 16 years of prodigious labor as President of the University will, in time, become a great, living monument to his vision and devotion to the well-being of the State and University, and his exemplification of the virtues which the Christian religion embodies. He has established a claim upon the gratitude and af-fection of the pepole of Oklahoma so broad, that future generations of Oklahomans can produce few who will be his peer.

Be it therefore resolved, that these sentiments be sent to the family of Dr. Bizzell, and that this tribute be spread upon the records of the Oklahoma University Alumni Club of Washing-
