AMONG NEWSMEN on the scene of action June 6 to report the Allied invasion of France was Tom Yarbrough, '32, veteran war correspondent of the Pacific area now serving in the European sector.

As a representative of the combined U. S. press agencies, Yarbrough viewed the landing from a British destroyer which was anchored about a mile and a half off the coast of France. His eyewitness account follows:

This little ship with four hot guns is going back to England now after spending 12 incredible hours in the front ranks of the first phase of the Allied invasion of France, an operation that came off 10 times as smoothly as anyone aboard expected.

From where we sat about a mile and a half offshore, it seemed too smooth and easy to be true. Men of this ship, through several tense and expectant months, had come to refer to this thing as "that blood bath." It still seems incredible that in 12 hours within easy shooting distance of Hitler's Europe, this force of men and ships did not encounter a single German plane or ship. It was like seeing a play in which some of the leading actors fail to show up.

With strong binoculars we saw thousands of men and machines tumble safely across beaches bristling with ugly spikes driven into the sand at crazy angles and topped with mines. This account embraces only the things we could see and which were reported to us from the shore immediately ahead.

Units participating in the land, sea and air attack were not identified until later in June in an announcement from military authorities. Among the units involved was the Second Infantry division, which includes a number of Sooner alumni.

Back From Battlefronts

Maj. Gilbert O. Halsey, '29-'30, Chickasha, who holds the second highest record of missions accomplished in the European theater, returned home this spring for a rest leave. A veteran of 156 missions, he holds the American Distinguished Flying Cross, the British Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. Major Halsey went to England in October, 1941, as a member of the Royal Air Force and later transferred to the U. S. Air Force. He commanded a Thunderbolt squadron. At the end of his leave, he was ordered to Washington, D. C., for orders.

▶ Maj. J. C. Hamilton, '31-'32, Oklahoma City, has been home on a 30-day leave after serving for 19 months as a combat pilot in the European theater. He holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, an Air Medal with nine Oak Leaf Clusters, and has been recommended for the Silver Star. The D.F.C. was awarded for leading a mission on Toulon, and the Silver Star was recommended for three missions over Rome. In all, Major Hamilton went on 51 missions, accumulating a total of 850 hours of flying time. He is a former Oklahoma City amateur golf champion.

After two years in the Southwest Pacific with the Medical Corps, Capt. Frank C. Binkley, '39 med, Oklahoma City, has returned to the United States for hospitalization. He was sent to Harmon General Hospital, Longview, Texas, for treatment of malaria and dengue fever. He was attached to an Aviation Engineering battalion building air fields in New Guinea. Before entering the service Captain Binkley was staff physician with the Paramount Motion Picture Company in California.

▶ Maj. Ellis L. Brown, '30eng, Duncan, has returned from the Southwest Pacific theater of operations where he was a bomber pilot for 14 months. He expected to be assigned to Command and General Staff School and an advanced air combat training station. Major Brown holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, an Air Medal to which an Oak Leaf Cluster will be added, a presidential unit citation given to the Jolly Rogers group, and a Silver Star. He took part in 67 combat missions from a New Guinea bomber base.

▶ Maj. Harry Hughes, '20ba, Norman, who was wounded in action several times with the 45th Division, has returned to the United States wearing the Order of the Purple Heart. Major Hughes was at Anzio when he received orders to come home on April 1. He reported to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, for further assignment. He was first injured last July in Sicily, when he was hit in 18 places by shell fragments. After moving into Italy he was injured four more times by shell fire, once seriously enough to spend 15 days in a hospital. An Oak Leaf Cluster was added to the Purple Heart for each additional injury.

► Capt. John O. Gossett, '30-'34, Norman, is a patient in Battey General Hospital, Rome, Georgia, having returned from service with the 45th Division in Europe.

▶ Pfc. James P. Trent, '42-'43, Prague, is convalescing at the Naval Hospital, Oakland, Cali-

fornia, after serving with the Marine Corps on Bougainville.

► Col. Roger Wood Peard, '04-'10, formerly of Enid, has returned from a two-year tour of duty in the South Pacific with the Marine Corps to duty at Camp Pendleton, California. A member of the Marine Corps since 1915, he has been on duty in the South Pacific since April, 1942. During his Marine career, he has served in Honolulu, San Francisco and the South Pacific.

► Among a group of 45th Division veterans who recently returned to the United States were Capt. Carson L. Oglesbee, '37med, Muskogee, and Capt. Charles W. Cleverdon, '33bus, and Staff Sgt. Clarence Spence, '26bus, both of Oklahoma City. Captain Cleverdon was intelligence officer of the Artillery battalion commanded by Lt. Col. Dwight Funk, '24, Oklahoma City.

►Lt. Col. J. R. Hinshaw, '21med, Norman, last month completed a trip around the world and was scheduled to arrive for a visit at home with his family. He has been stationed in the European theater of operations with the Medical Corps.

▶ Lt. Willard Anderson, '37eng, Seminole, has returned to the United States for duty at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland, after serving abroad for two years. Lieutenant Anderson was with the Army Ordnance in North Africa, Sicily and Italy. He was assigned to Aberdeen as an instructor.

►Maj. Virgil Johnson, '35ma, '40ph.d, former technician in the zoology department at the University, was assigned to duty in Washington, D. C., upon his return from New Guinea, where he was stationed with the Air Force. The first acquaintance Major Johnson saw after arriving in the United States was Capt. Al B. ▶ Lt. Loyl Skinner, '39-'41, Washington, Oklahoma, was home on a furlough last month after completing 70 missions as pilot of a bomber in Italy. He holds the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters.

▶ Maj. Tom R. Watts, '38ba, Oklahoma City, has returned to the United States after 14 months of action with the Marine Corps in the Pacific. He was stationed aboard a battleship.

▶ Lt. G. Scaling Corbyn, '38bus, Oklahoma City, was ordered to report to Fort Riley, Kansas, after he returned from the South Pacific where he served for 25 months with the Cavalry in Australia and New Guinea. Decorations

The 56th Evacuation Hospital in Italy, to which Capt. William R. Turnbow, '35med, Tulsa, is attached, has been commended for its heroic work on the Anzio beachhead by General Mark Clark.

Captain Turnbow is an anesthetist on the staff of the hospital, which was under daily artillery fire for over ten weeks at Anzio. The hospital's normal capacity was 750 beds, but it handled as many as 1,129 patients and 100 operations in a day.

The 56th was activated at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, in April, 1942, and went overseas a year later. It was stationed at Bizerte before going to Italy.

▶ Lt. James M. Mahaffey, '40-'42, Norman, has been awarded the Silver Star, the Order of the Purple Heart, and an Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster for service as a bombardier-navigator with the Air Forces in the Southwest Pacific.

► Tech. Sgt. Raymond D. Hooper, '39-'40, Norman, recently received commendation from his battalion commander, Maj. Harry W. Hughes, '29ba, also of Norman.

The commendation read in part as follows: "As commanding officer of the First battalion, 179th Infantry, it is with much pleasure and gratitude that I extend to you and to each and every one of the members of the First battalion my personal commendation. In the actions of February 11, 13, 16 to 21, 1944, near—Italy, in the defense of our beachhead lines, you carried on bravely and courageously in the face of overwhelming enemy strength... To you who fought with such loyalty, perserverance and determination against the enemy must go the credit for the successful defense of the beachhead line and of the beachhead itself."

▶ Maj. John A. Myers, '41 eng, Dallas, Texas, engineering officer with the Air Force in the European theater, has been awarded the Legion of Merit and an Air Medal for excellent service.

Major Myers has been overseas for two years in England and Italy.

► Lt. Donald H. Dines, '41ba, Norman, has been awarded the Air Medal for "exceptional meritorious achievement while participating in bomber combat missions over Occupied Europe."

The decoration was pinned on him by Lt. Col. Dexter Hodge, commanding officer of his Liberator group. Lieutenant Dines has been on missions over Gutersloh, Gotha and Frankfurt.

▶ Lt. Col. Earl Taylor, '37-'39, Konawa, commander of an Infantry battalion of the 45th Division, returned to the United States this spring wearing the Silver Star for outstanding work in combat.

Colonel Taylor, who was with the 45th until it was within 20 miles of Cassino, was a patient in a General Hospital in Tunisia for two and a half months before returning home. He expected to be put on inactive status last month.

▶ Maj. John T. Cooper, '36ba, former Wewoka lawyer, has been awarded the Bronze Star for saving the life of a fellow officer in Italy. The officer was buried beneath debris when the house being used for a fire direction center was hit by a German shell.

Major Cooper, executive officer of the Field Artillery battalion occupying that area, searched the ruins under enemy fire to see if any of the occupants were still alive, and found the officer pinned beneath rubble. He freed him and tendered medical aid until a Medical detachment arrived.

The battalion to which Major Cooper is attached is credited with helping repel three German attacks on the Anzio beachead.

▶ Lt. Louis C. Roark, '40geol, Tulsa, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal and the Order of the Purple Heart for his record of achievement with the 13th Air Force in the South Pacific.

Pilot of a B-24, Lieutenant Roark recently returned to the United States after completing 43 combat missions over Japanese territory.

▶ Major Harry M. Thompson, '37-'38, Vinita, has been decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters for service as a P-40 pilot in the Asiatic Pacific theater.

Major Thompson recently returned from foreign duty after completing 30 missions. He is credited with the destruction of one Zero.

▶ Staff Sgt. Francis Pease, '40, Hollis, has been awarded the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster for "meritorious achievement while participating in bombardment missions over enemy territory."

Sergeant Pease has been waist gunner on a Liberator in the European theater of operations for more than six months. He is credited with shooting down one enemy plane.

► Capt. Carl T. McLean, '39-'41, Ardmore, Marine fighter pilot, has been awarded the Air Medal for action in the Southwest Pacific. He has three Zeros and more than 100 missions against the Japanese to his credit.

Operating from Munda, Vella la Vella and Bougainville, his squadron has made numerous raids on enemy shipping, airdromes and ground installations.

► Capt. Walter S. Murphy, '38-'40, Norman, Eighth Air Force navigator, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and an Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. When Captain Murphy completed his tour of missions, he stayed in England as an instructor.

▶ Lt. Samuel S. Gill, Jr., '37, Oklahoma City, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement as a pilot in the South Pacific war zone. Lieutenant Gill was formerly in the Field Artillery but transferred to the Air Force for pilot training.

▶ Maj. Waldo W. Montgomery, '29-'34, Norman, has been awarded the Legion of Merit for "exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services" in the action at Kwajalein. Major Montgomery is on the Artillery staff of an Infantry Division.

▶ Maj. Joseph R. Boosa, '29ba, Pauls Valley, has been awarded the Order of the Purple Heart for injuries received in the Mediterranean theater of war. Field Artillery officer with the 45th Division, Major Boosa has been in action at Sicily, Salerno and Anzio. He received his promotion to major in April.

Lt. Bryce Moore, '42ba, Oklahoma City, pilot of the Flying Fortress Esky based in England with the Eighth Air Force, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and an Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. He has been on more than 25 missions over Europe.

On a recent trip to Stettin, Germany, heavy anti-aircraft fire hit Lieutenant Moore's plane, damaging one engine's supercharger and destroying another's exhaust line. Despite the severe damage, Lieutenant Moore bombed the target and got the ship safely back to its base. Last month he was home on leave.

Lt. Hugh N. West, Jr., '38-'41, Oklahoma

City, pilot of a Liberator bomber with the 15th Air Force, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement in aerial flight against the enemy. Lieutenant West has been on numerous raids on German-held targets in Austria, Rumania, Hungary and Northern Italy.

▶ Lt. Charles P. Ray, '39, Oklahoma City, a prisoner of war in Germany, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for a flying feat accomplished as co-pilot of a Flying Fortress before he was taken captive.

On the mission for which the D. F. C. was awarded, the Fortress was badly damaged by flak before the target was reached and the pilot was disabled. Lieutenant Ray, though wounded in the leg, held the unconscious pilot in his seat with one hand and flew the plane with the other.

After the bombing run was completed and the ship started back to England one engine died and another lost power, but Lieutenant Ray flew back to the field. As he went in to land, the Fortress just ahead of him crashed on the runway and he had to swerve dangerously to avoid crashing into it. On a later mission he failed to return and was reported a prisoner.

► The Silver Star has been awarded to Capt. John O. Givens, '38bus, Oklahoma City, for gallantry in action near Cape Iris, New Guinea, last February. Captain Givens is a Field Artillery officer.

▶ Maj. Thomas R. Baker, '35-'37, Oklahoma City, was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his work with the Air Force in the Burma area on the same day he was promoted to major, May 9.

Major Baker, who also holds the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, is commanding officer of a C-47 group which transports supplies and equipment to British troops in Burma. Before entering the Air Force he was employed by Cessna Aircraft in Wichita, Kansas.

▶ Lt. George G. Hamilton, '37-'38, former Harmon rancher, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in aerial flight in the Mediterranean area. He has 54 successful missions and four confirmed victories to his credit.

The citation accompanying the D. F. C. specifically mentioned a mission last March over Bulgaria, in which Lieutenant Hamilton led the squadron escorting the heavy bombers. When the bombers were attacked by an enemy squadron, Lieutenant Hamilton completely dispersed the enemy formation, thus enabling the bombers to proceed to the objective, inflicting grave damage on enemy installations.

▶ Capt. Joe H. Powers, Jr., '38, Tulsa, has been awarded the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross with four Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters for service with the Eighth Air Force.

Captain Powers has been stationed in England since January, 1943, having received his commission the previous October. After completing 89 missions over enemy territory, he was assigned to an Eighth Air Force Composite Station in England as a P-47 Thunderbolt instructor.

Deaths in Service

Lt. Herrold N. Brickel, '39-'43, Washington, Oklahoma, a Field Artillery liaison pilot, was killed in a plane crash at Camp Gordon, Georgia, on May 3. He received his commission at Fort Sill in the summer of 1943 and his liaison pilot's wings later at Pittsburg, Kansas.

At the University, Lieutenant Brickel was a member of Pi Tau Sigma engineering fraternity and a captain in the R.O.T.C. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Brickel, of Wash-

ington, and a sister, Mrs. Paul Kreiger (Mary Brickel, '37ed), Marlow.

► Lt. Orville S. Witt, Jr., '38, Oklahoma City, pilot who has been listed as missing in action since December 20, 1942, was officially reported as killed in action and awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.


His parents, Dr. and Mrs. O. S. Witt of Oklahoma City, received a letter from his squadron commander, describing Lieutenant Witt's last flight. The squadron was bombing Romily-sur-Seine, when it was attacked by a German fighter force. Two engines of Lieutenant Witt's ship, the *Zombie*, were put out of commission by cannon fire and he was forced to drop out of formation.

The Zombie was last seen going into a cloud bank in an attempt to evade the German fighters. The squadron commander did not know whether the ship crashed on French soil or in the Channel.

▶ Pvt. William H. Rutledge, '43, Ponca City, was struck by a stray bullet during combat practice at Camp Maxey, Texas, on April 29 and died April 30 in the hospital there. He entered the Army in April, 1943, receiving basic training with the Tank Destroyer Corps at Camp Hood, Texas.

When the Army Specialized Training Program was set up, he was assigned to the unit at Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville, Texas, until it was disbanded last March. At that time he was transferred to Camp Maxey for Infantry training. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Homer C. Rutledge, Ponca City.

► Lt, Carl A. Herrmann, '40-'42, Sapulpa, an Army Air Force bombardier, was killed in action over Germany on May

7. He entered the Air Force in March, 1943, received his commission at Dalhart, Texas, and went overseas in December.

Before entering service, Lieutenant Herrmann was employed at the Beach Aircraft factory in Wichita, Kansas, and the Douglas plant in Santa Monica, California. He was an engineering student in the University. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl L. Herrmann, Sapulpa, and a brother, Sgt. Lewis L. Herrman, with the Army in China.

►Lt. Reaford C. McCraw, '35, Norman, was killed in action in the Mediterranean area on an undisclosed date. His name was included on a June 2 casualty list released by the War Department, but no details were given.

At the University, Lieutenant McCraw was a student in the College of Engineering. Survivors include his father, Robert H. McCraw, Norman and Oklahoma City.

Missing in Action

Lt. Col. Edwin A. Bland, '34-'39, Waurika, has been missing in action with the Air Force over Italy since April 16. A column by Ernie Pyle, filed from London May 28, recounted his friendship with the flier and what he had heard from Italy regarding Colonel Bland's last mission. Said Pyle:

I suppose my best friend in Italy was Lt. Col. Ed Bland, a dive-bomber squadron leader.... Word has just come that he has been shot down.... The letter that brought the word to me said this: "Ed was strafing about 30 feet above the

"Ed was strafing about 30 feet above the ground when a small shell set his plane afree underneath. Ed didn't know it until his wing man radioed him. Then he climbed to 1,500 feet and bailed out. The wing man said his chute didn't open till he was 200 feet from the ground. There was a great deal of shooting and one theory is that it was directed at him, but majority opinion ruled differently and the boys believe he is OK."

Wick Fowler of the *Dallas News* was a close friend of Ed's. We used to sit around indulging in idiotic talk and Ed was always talking about how funny it would be to telephone Rome for hotel reservations and throw the Germans into a panic.

After I left Italy Ed's oil line stopped up one day on a mission near Rome and he was certain he would have to bail out. Later he told Wick that while he was in trouble and sure he'd have to jump he got to thinking about the telephone idea and had to laugh to himself.

And now that he really has bailed out, Wick sends this thought in a letter: "Ed's time was short at 1,500 but I have a hunch the telephone idea came to him again on the way down." If Ed did call up Rome for reservations I hope the Germans gave him the royal suite, for he's the best there is.

▶ Maj. Forrest H. Barker, '34-'40, Norman, squadron commander in Sicily and Italy, has been missing in action over Italy since April 30. He completed 42 missions as a pilot and held the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Order of the Purple Heart. Major Barker was injured twice, once in combat and once in a jeep accident. He has two brothers in service, Lt. Norman Barker, '40, in England, and Lt. Jack Barker, '37-'40, with the Paratroops at Camp Polk, Louisiana.

► George S. Coleman, '39-'41, Calgary, Canada, pilot officer in the Royal Canadian Air Force, has been missing in action over Europe since April 25. He was stationed in England.

► Maj. Robert Lewis Cox, '36ba, Norman, squadron commander and second highest ranking officer in his Bombardment group, is missing in action over Germany. Before entering the Air Force, Major Cox was in the advertising department of Montgomery Ward Company in Fort Worth, Texas.

► Flight Officer Howard G. Carpenter, '37, Oklahoma City, member of a Fighter squadron, has been reported missing in action over Tunisia with the Air Force. He was awarded the Air Medal with bronze Oak Leak Clusters.

Injured in Service

Lewis H. Cofer, '26, Blackwell, technician fifth grade in the Field Artillery, has returned to the United States for treatment of injuries received near Naples in action with the 45th Division.

His first injury was a shattered left elbow received when he dove into a slit trench to escape German bombs. Hospitalized in Naples, he was injured by glass splinters when the hospital was bombed. He was convalescing in McCloskey General Hospital at Temple, Texas.

► Col. Clarence Cochran, '22, Okemah, who was wounded in action with the 45th Division Infantry battalion which he commanded in Sicily and Italy, was a patient in the same hospital.

Prisoners of War

Internees are provided with club lounges, facilities for study, sports, motion pictures and lectures, the bulletin stated.

► Lt. Robert Whittet, '37-'41, Enid, navigator on a Liberator bomber reported missing in action since February 26, has been reported a prisoner of war in Germany.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Whittet of Enid, received a letter from him stating that he was well and interned in a temporary camp.

How to Write Prisoners

Instructions which should be followed in sending mail to prisoners of war were released last month in the *Prisoners of War Bulletin* published by the American Red Cross. They are as follows:

Do not use V-Mail forms.

Be sure that the address is correct; letters should not be sent in care of the American Red Cross or the International Committee.

It is essential to print or type letters for prisoners held by Japan. For Europe, if not convenient to type letters, they should be written clearly.

Letters to Japanese-held prisoners must not exceed 24 words in the text. To prisoners in Europe it is preferable that they should not exceed one typewritten sheet.

Avoid the use of slang expressions. They confuse censors and delay mail.

Because of censorship and distribution problems in enemy countries, families should not write oftener than twice a week, and once a week is preferable. There is no limit, theoretically, to the number of letters a prisoner may receive. Experience has shown, however, that too great a volume of correspondence slows up delivery at the other end.

Unmounted photographs may be sent in letters but not in parcels. The prisoner's name and complete address should always be written on the back of the photograph.

Many relatives and friends put postage stamps on letters to prisoners of war. The United States Post Office wishes it to be made known as widely as possible that all mail (except air mail) is carried free to prisoners of war. The charge for airmail letters is now 6 cents for each half ounce, to European countries.

Recent letters from German camps indicate that air-mail letters arrive about one month quicker than ordinary mail. Mail for prisoners in the Far East goes by air, free of charge, to Teheran.
