A coroner's verdict of double murder and suicide was returned in the deaths of Luther E. Mayes, '18-'19, '22, '24, Mrs. Mayes, and Paul I. Daily, her son by an earlier marriage, in Oklahoma City July 18. Mr. Mayes, an employee of the Oklahoma City Air Service Command and owner of farms and oil royalties around Oklahoma City, Norman, and Shawnee, shot and killed Mrs. Mayes and her son and later committed suicide. Survivors include several brothers, Sterling L. Mayes, '26ed, '40m.ed, Oklahoma City, Asa Lee Mayes, '28, overseas with a Naval Construction Battalion, and L. Vernon Mayes, '34ba, Moore, and two sons by a previous marriage, Ensign Harry L. Mayes, '41-'44, on foreign duty, and Luther E. Mayes, Jr., '39-'42, a midshipman at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland.

The home game schedule includes games with the Norman Navy Zoomers, Texas Aggies, Kansas State, Texas Christian University, Missouri and Nebraska. The Sooner-Oklahoma Aggie game is A. and M.'s home game this year and is not included in the season ticket.

RESERVED SEATS for the three games in Taft Stadium, Oklahoma City, cost \$2.75 each, tax included, for the Texas Aggie and Texas Christian games, and \$2.50 each for the Nebraska game. The first two mentioned will be played at night.

OPENING GAME of the season will be played against the Norman Navy Zoomers on September 30. The following week the Sooners will meet the Texas Aggies in a night game in Taft Stadium.
