THE COUNCIL ON Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association has voted to extend its approval to the University of Oklahoma School of X-ray Technicians.

► The students in the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine, under the sponsorship of the recently organized Student Council, on December 9 published the first issue of the student newspaper. Mark Johnson, member of the junior class, is editor of this publication. The first issue was well received and future issues will be released every two weeks.

► Plans for the publication of a Medical School annual are under way by the students in the School of Medicine. Raymond Hinshaw, president of the junior class, is serving as editor for the first yearbook to be devoted entirely to the Medical School. The annual will consist of approximately 75 pages and will contain pictures of the faculty, students, buildings, student activities and a complete alumni directory. 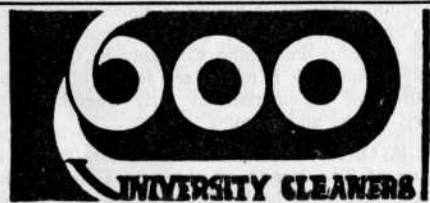
