Engaged for three years at a sliding scale salary of \$8,000, \$9,000 and \$10,000 per year, Jim Tatum, discharged navy lieutenant who was head coach at North Carolina in 1942 and at Jacksonville, Florida, Naval Air Station last year, succeeds Dewey "Snorter" Luster, who resigned because of ill health, as Sooner football coach.

The \$27,000 that will be paid Tatum for three years work will be the highest salary ever paid a coach at Norman. Tom Stidham and Biff Jones each received \$7,500 annually from the University. However because of the present high income tax and the shrinking purchasing power of the American dollar, Stidham and Jones could buy far more with their salaries.

Tatum brought with him as one assistant Charles "Bud" Wilkinson, also a discharged navy lieutenant. Wilkinson was for five years assistant to Ossie Solem at Syracuse and for one year to Dr. George Hauser at Minnesota. Tatum was promised a free hand in the naming of his assistants and will designate two others later.

Tatum played tackle in 1931-32-33 at North Carolina U. Wilkinson played guard for Bernie Bierman's Minnesota Gophers in 1934-35 and quarterback in 1936.

Both were the unanimous choice of the University athletic council's screening committee and also of the University Board of Regents, President

Although President Cross said members of Luster's football coaching staff not to be retained would remain on salary until they placed them-selves elsewhere, Frank Crider, Freshman coach, resigned as of September 1, 1946 and wished Tatum and Wilkinson luck.

Tatum is the 12th football coach within the 52year period the University has sponsored a team. The others and their records:

Despite his long, long period, Bennie Owen's teams have the highest offensive average with 26.5 points per game. The offensive rating is Owen 26.5, Ewing 25.5, Parrington 20.0, Luster 19.5, Roberts 18.6, Stidham 15.5, McMahan 14.3, Lindsey 12.1, Jones 10.1, Hardage 8.7 and Harts (Harts' first team, only two men of whom had ever seen a game, was beaten 0-34 by the Oklahoma City Town Team in the only game it played.)

Sooner teams coached by brilliant Verne Parrington, later a Pulitzer Prize winner, have the best defensive record. The defensive rating is: Parrington 5.3 points per game scored against his teams, Roberts 5.8, Stidham 6.1, Jones 6.1, McMahan 6.9, Hardage 7.1, Owen 7.3, Lindsey 10.3, Lwing 11.2, Luster 11.5 and Harts 34.

Parrington's teams scored the highest percentage of wins at .818, followed by Stidham .771, Owen

.711, Luster .600, Jones .600, Roberts .600, Ewing .571, McMahan .555, Lindsey .527, Hardage .478 and Harts .000.

Several factors work against the creditability of the above figures. For example, touchdowns counted only five points while Harts, Parrington, Roberts, McMahan and Ewing coached and through the first eight years of Owen's long term. On the other hand the old-timers' teams had to make only five yards in three downs. There was no forward pass until 1906. On the other hand, modern coaches didn't have access to the old onside kick, the custom of permitting offensive players to recover punts regardless of whether they had been touched. Also, the moderns played far tougher

L. E. "Jap" Haskell, Sooner athletic director, is busy with plans to introduce Tatum and Wilkinson to Sooner alumni and fans. On January 29 the new coaches met the state's sports writers and radio broadcasters, on February 2 they meet high school coaches of the state and on February 4 they begin a statewide two-weeks tour of larger alumni cities located on the outskirts of the state.
