Disabled Men Have Sports Class

Students with physical disabilities or weaknesses enrolling in the University this fall will find a special physical education program made to order for them.

The course is set up on a strictly individual basis for the disabled men, many of whom are veterans. H. V. McDermott, director of the course, obtains a complete medical record of each disabled man and prescribes with a University physician's recommendation exercises for the student to take in place of football, basketball and other strenuous sports.

Each man is encouraged to continue the training during his spare time. The three hour a week schedule serves chiefly as a guide and encouragement to the boys to attain better use of the muscles,

Bars, pulleys, bar-bells, horseshoes, archery, flycasting, table tennis, punching bags are all used in the curriculum. Those who can take more strenuous exercises use the indoor swimming pool, basketball courts and badminton equipment.

Game rules are altered to fit the cases. "The boys can more or less make their own rules," McDermott said. "If they had to follow all the conventional game rules, there would be no point in their being here."

Disabilities which appear among enrolees are heart ailments, hernia, general physical debility, flat feet, and generally weak condition. Some paralytics, amputees, and post-operative convalescents also enrol. Emphasis is placed on giving workouts which are safe for the individual student.

As soon as space will permit and equipment may be obtained, McDermott plans a special program of physiotherapy to resume treatment where the army doctors left off.



The Drug Mill
