FRAZIER, '24ba, '32m.ed, Superintendent of Schools, WEWOKA, and the long-time most efficient executive secretary of the Oklahoma State School Administrators Association: DENVER DEE KIRKLAND, '33m.ed, Superintendent of Schools, McALESTER, along with the "Big Chief" of the education set-up in the state of Oklahoma, "The Commissioner" Dr. OLIVER HODGE, '33m.ed, '37d.ed, State Superintendent of Instruction, OKLAHOMA CITY. Yes, those nine Sooners will select a total of 15 nominees to go on the ballot from which will be selected one board member each for districts 1, 3, 5, 6 and 8. As of April 15 the fifteen nominees selected by the nominating committee will be placed on the 1949 ballot and distributed world-wide to the thousands of members of the University of Oklahoma Alumni Association. The vote will continue until midnight May 25, then the election committee will make its final tabulation. At the conclusion of the balloting, five O.U. alumni will have been selected to serve a period of three years on the governing board of the general alumni organization.

Indeed, it is the usual busy spring season. Sessions for immediate future participation are now being formed in ADA; CLEVELAND, OHIO; ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI; CHICAGO, ILLINOIS; MUSKOGEE; LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA; NEW YORK CITY and dozens of other cities, towns and villages throughout America. Achievement Day April 12

The University of Oklahoma and its Alumni Association will honor five public-spirited persons Tuesday, April 12, 1949, by presenting them with the Distinguished Service Citation.

The Achievement Day awards were begun last year and are intended to recognize the accomplishments of "distinguished Oklahomans and/or alumni of the University of Oklahoma wherever located."

As many of you will recall the awards were made last year to Mike Monroney, '24ba, General W. S. Key, General Raymond S. McLain, Everette Lee DeGolyer, '11ba, and Lynn Riggs, '23.

The winners are selected by the Distinguished Service Citations Selection Committee composed of three men appointed by President Cross, three appointed by the president of the alumni association, and the president of the Dads' Association or someone appointed by him.

The selections are based upon the following qualifications:

a. Good citizenship.

- b. Distinguished service to an Oklahoma community, or the State of Oklahoma, or the United States of America, or the United Nations organization.
- c. Humanitarian, cultural, intellectual, or scientific contributions.
- d. Unselfish service or leadership over an extended period of years.
- e. Research that contributes to the public welfare.
- f. Pioneering in new fields, thereby advancing ideas and opportunities for development.
- g. Distinguished achievement in a chosen profession.
