## Fraternities Lampooned

## 25 Years Ago

The class of 1924 will remember the lampooning the fraternities and sororities received in the Sooner Yearbook of that year. Giving a comic history of each social order, they said of Beta Theta Pi: "One of the so-called Miami Triad the Wooglins prove that the average college students will try anything. Since 1839 the Betas have infested many of the more careless American colleges and universities. Perhaps no fraternity has impressed the country yokel so much as this organization, judging from its membership."

The Sigma Nu boys also came in for some of the broad satire. Their fraternity's history was explained thusly, "This order was started in the back of a saloon by a group of drunken cadets with the delirium tremens from the Virginia Military Institute. Considering their sin they promptly sobered up, denounced their faith to the new born fraternity and joined the Kappa Alpha (Southern). . . The Sigma Nus also have an orchestra, whose only redeeming quality is that they occasionally leave town."

The girls didn't escape the editor's witticisms. The Delta Delta Delta sorority was given an unflattering history: "This honorary agricultural sorority was founded by Isaac Walton's daughter. Isaac had such luck in spearing fish, that the daughter tried the trident and almost got a man. The Tri Delts are still trying the trident. . . . Sorority publication—Farm and Fireside."

The Pi Bcta Phi sorority didn't fare any better. "This women's auxiliary to Beta Theta Pi was founded by two shoe-shiner's wives who were in the Sorosis Clubs, before anyone had learned anything of precaution. . . . They have successfully lived down their reputation for wildness largely because they don't get to date any more, and girls can't be mean with themselves."




## Aggies Fall With Law

"Main headache . . . Quarterback: With Mitchell gone, this is definitely the focal point of Coach Bud Wilkinson's worries."

And well it may be. Sooner Sports fans consider Mitchell the only one of his breed. Yet, the Big Red will have the services of Royal, triple-threat back, who may get the starting assignment in the Mitchell role. If he should not deliver, Wilkinson still has Claude Arnold, Okmulgee junior, and Bob Ewbank, Norman junior, both returning lettermen in the quarterback position. One of the most promising sophomores is Frank Silva from Crooked Oak who showed a marked skill in scampering with and schooling a football in the spring game of the alumni-varsity. He may well be the answer to the Mitchell dilemma. Much of the speculation should be answered by the assignments given in the Boston game and the way in which they are carried out.

The rest of the backfield looks like a coach's dream. Available for service are Thomas at right half, one of the nations leading ground gainers last year; Leon Heath, Hollis junior, at full; and Pcarson at left half.

Nor will any of these positions be a one man job. If the above do not get the starting nod, then there will be Buddy Jones, Holdenville junior, ready at left half; George Brewer, Lubbock, Texas, senior, and Tommy Gray, Seminole, junior set at right half, and Ken Parker, Wichita Falls, Texas, senior, and Ed Lisak, Kalamazoo, Michigan, junior, at fullback. Other lettermen and sophomores will be ready to step in and take up the slack if it is necessary.

The line looks strong. The ends should be the best in the nation. At left end Owens and Ken Tipps, Oklahoma City senior, will hold out. And at right end are the veterans Frankie Anderson,

Oklahoma City junior, and Bobby Goad, Musko-gee senior.

Tackles will crowd the ends for honors with Wade Walker on the right side heading the list. On the left side of the line will be Leon Manley, Hollis senior, and the much touted sophomore, Jim Weatherall, Hooker.

Guard is a well lettered position with McNabb, and Dee Andros, Oklahoma City senior, to the left of center and West, Clair Mayes, Muskogee junior, and Dean Smith, Tulsa junior, on the right.

Center may be a bit weaker this year with Charley Dowell, Tulsa junior, and Bob Bodenhamer, Waurika, senior, and several more trying to work their way into the king size shoes of Pete Tillman.

There's the backfield and there's the line. Other names will be seen in the lineup from time to time which should give Oklahoma some of the best reserve strength in the business.

These then are some of the reasons for Rice's selection. But as Keith said when asked which would be the toughest games of the season:

"The toughest games? All of 'em. After you have a good year, they all put you on their homecoming date and direct their season's concentration at you." The tough games ahead following the Boston encounter are:

## Manley May Move Mountains

"I was sure glad when you got that first team out of there, but say! Who in the heck was that big, rough left tackle that came in with your second team?"

Mel Sheehan, Missouri's big right end whom the Oklahoma team named on their all-opponents eleven in 1948, was talking to Sooner players after the Tiger-Sooner battle at Norman last year.

The player Sheehan meant was Leon Manley of Hollis, Oklahoma's second team left tackle who played behind Homer Paine. Now that Paine, three-time all-Big Seven conference tackle, has graduated, Manley will be the Sooners' starting left tackle this season.

He's a popular choice with the Sooner players. They call him "One Round," because of his hustle and determination. While he isn't as neat a blocker as Wade Walker, Oklahoma right tackle, Manley blocks so aggressively that he gets the job done anyhow. Fastest tackle on the squad, he's a good downfield blocker, too.

A quiet, good-natured 205-pound boy with an unruly shock of blond hair, Manley likes offense better than anything else in football.

"The most fun in football is when we've got a split-T drive under way, and are makin' yards down the field," he says.

Manley enjoys the strategy of split-T line play. On handoffs straight ahead, the charging Sooner halfback watches the blocking develop in front of him instead of keeping his eye on the ball. It's up to the quarterback to put the ball on the half-

back's hip. The halfback feels for the ball, and clutches it on his way to the hole, but he never takes his eye off the hole.

"I like to block in the direction the opponent cuts." Manley asserts, "If he crosscharges, you take him the way he wants to go and our halfback goes the other way. Makes no difference what the guy in front of you does, he's always wrong."

Manley says the left halfback on his side of the line, fellows like Lindell Pearson, the shooting 190-pounder, and Buddy Jones, the 154-pound Holdenville Flitter, are good at helping him set up blocks. "If I'm to take my man out, Pearson and Jones fake out to help widen him, then cut in." Manley explains.

Al Weiner, strapping North Carolina wing whom the Sooners encountered in the 1949 Sugar Bowl game, is the best end Manley ever faced.

"He got out well in spite of his great size." Manley says, "On offense, he lined up on first one side of the line, then the other. When we knew a pass was coming, we doubled-teamed him, trying to hold him up. On our side of the line, Jim Owens and Paine took him, then Ken Tipps and I. On the other side Wade Walker and Bobby Goad had him, then when our second team came in, Nute Trotter and Frankie Anderson. On the first play of the game, Walker and Goad held him up and that was why Owens tackled Rodgers for a loss. But Weiner was good."

Manley says Texas' line of last year was the best he ever played against, with North Carolina second. He enjoyed playing behind Homer Paine, superb Sooner left tackle, but complains "When I got in, Homer usually had the opposition end all softened up." He says Jim Weatherall, his 220-pound sophomore understudy from Hooker, is a comer on downfield blocking. And Wade Walker, Sooner right tackle, is his blocking model.

"Wade goes on the count. He fires hard and he turns 'em. That's what it takes in the split-T, that and the downfield blocking," Manley declares.

Manley has played virtually every position in football. At Hollis, his home town, he was three years a 100-pound single wing blocking back on the junior high team, then played tackle and guard in high school. Joe Bailey Metcalf and Dick Highfill were his coaches.

After a tour in the navy, Manley came to Oklahoma in 1946 and played left end on the B team. His only varsity experience that season was four minutes at end in the Gator Bowl game. In 1947 he was being groomed at Oklahoma's starting fullback against Detroit when a siege of boils benched him.

"They can have that fullback position," says Manley, "I don't like it. I carried the ball once against Texas that year. Bill Morris, our tackle, forgot to pull. The Texas middle line-backer met me in the hole."

Manley likes Coach Bud Wilkinson's two-team system. After ten minutes rest, you can go twice as hard, he says.

"I wish we had three teams," he concluded, "Look how hard you could go then."

## No More London Bridges

Oklahoma is in for some better constructed highway bridges as a result of a new course offered at the University. D. W. Bardwell, '42eng, Oklahoma City structural engineer, will teach a four-hour course in the design of highway bridges.
