This is the name under which the 25-year-old National Association of Legal Aid Organizations was reorganized and incorporated at Boston, Massachusetts, on October 15, 1949.

The purposes of this association are to promote and develop legal aid work; to encourage the formation of new legal aid organizations wherever they may be needed, whose purpose is to render legal aid without charge to all who may appear to be entitled and who are unable to procure assistance elsewhere.

U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson is honorary president of the association.
