'06 E. Frank Schramm, '06ba, has been chairman of the geology department at the University of Nebraska since 1936. Along with the chairmanship he is a consulting geologist for several mine and oil companies. While a student at the University Scramm was president of the athletic association and oratorical society, business manager for the *Umpire*, member of the geology club and Kappa Sigma, social fraternity. At the present time he is president of the student union board at the University of Nebraska and curator of geology in the university's state museum.

'11 Ross Taylor, '11-'16, resigned as city manager of Enid, effective February 1, to accept the city manager's job at Oklahoma City. He was elected to the position by a unanimous vote of the Oklahoma City council January 3. Taylor left the University in 1916 for service on the Mexican border with a national guard company of engineers. He later was commissioned in the corps of engineers and saw overseas duty in France in World War I. While city engineer at Yale, Taylor was pressed into the job as city manager. He filled this post from April of 1924 to 1927, when he resigned to go to Bartlesville. After 20 years as Bartlesville's manager, Taylor went to Enid June 1, 1947.

'13 William Aitkenhead, '13ma, professor emeritus of agricultural engineering at Purdue University, died December 17, 1949.

'14 C. B. Memminger, '14ba, '33Law, Atoka, was recently elected for a third three year term on the District Board of Directors for the Farm Credit Administration of Wichita. The recess appointment for the term ending December 31, 1955, is subject to senate confirmation. Wesley L. Nunn, '17, advertising manager of Standard Oil Company of Indiana, has been elected a member of the board of directors of the Advertising Council, Inc.

'18 C. T. Hughes, '18 eng, West Cheshire, Connecticut, was recently elected operating vice president of the Connecticut Light and Power Company. He has been with the company 31 years.

He was born near Mannheim, Germany, December 24, 1879. Linscheid was a member of the Oklahoma textbook commission from 1925 to 1931, serving as chairman the last two years. He was a member of the American Association of Teachers' Colleges and president of the Oklahoma Education association in 1931-32.

'21 Wendell P. Wettengel, '21-'25, died January 12 in a veterans hospital in Dallas. Wettengel, a veteran of World War II, was in the hospital to undergo surgery for a back injury suffered during the war.

First Dad's Day Held

25 Years Ago

Walter A. Morrow, '17, returned to Oklahoma City in 1925 after spending two years in Memphis and Pittsburgh working on newspapers. He returned to Oklahoma to re-associate himself with the *Oklahoma City Times*. Morrow had been engaged in newspaper work continuously since leaving the University. While a student he was editor of the campus daily. He later became editor-in-chief of the southwest group of the Scripps-Howard newspaper chain and later editor of the *Columbus (Ohio) Citizen*. Morrow died July 14, 1949.

C. Lee Furrow, '21ba, '22ma, was appointed instructor in zoology at the University of Kansas. Furrow spent the school year 1922-23 studying at Princeton toward his doctor's degree, having won a scholarship in zoology at Princeton while a student in the University of Oklahoma. The Play's the Thing

15 Years Ago

Here's further proof of the power of money. In 1935 the stags became so numerous at free Saturday afternoon dansants in the Oklahoma Union ballroom that an admission of twenty-five cents was charged gentlemen dancers without dates. Couples were admitted free. The number of stags immediately decreased and the number of women students escorted to the dances showed a striking increase.

An original three-act play by Robert Whitehand, '33ba, then a graduate student at the University of Iowa, was produced by the University Playhouse on that campus early in the spring of '35. Whitehand wrote the drama while he was on a fellowship to Iowa University. The play concerned Oklahoma oil fields and farmers. Whitehand was killed in action in France on March 27, 1945.

Weather Note. Spring's first gentle south wind arrived in Norman early in March bringing with it sand and dust from the dry Canadian River bed. While a large part of the state gasped through general dust storms, the campus got more than its share from the mile-wide river bed that accommodates the ten-foot-wide Canadian River.

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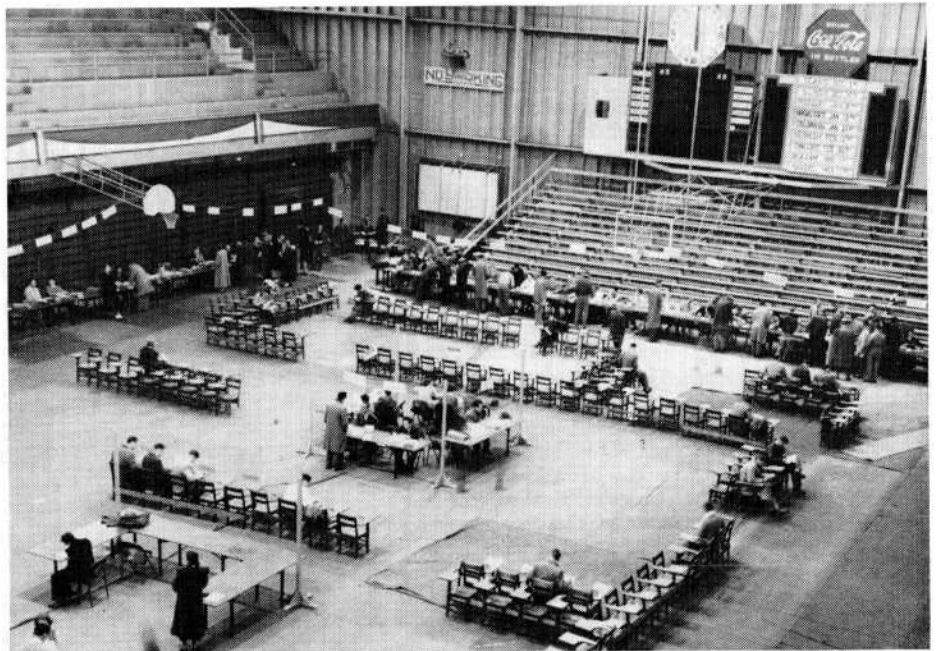
