

The book includes chapters which discuss leads that catch attention, mastering words, pre-testing copy, finding copy material in the commonplace, dressing facts with fiction, and pathways to placement. A concluding chapter presents "proof of the pudding," stories which show the varied approaches in publicity copy.

"Writing" Harral says," is like skating and dancing. You may sit on the sidelines watching the teacher, but it helps little. To learn, one must do." As an aid to those who do write, a "check list for publicity copy" is included in the appendix.

An active writer, publicist and lecturer, Harral has written four other books, Public Relations for Churches, Public Relations for Higher Education, Successful Letters for Churches and Publicity Problems.
