Broken Men-His Business

Paul Darrough, '13ba, '15Law, knows all his cases have one thing in common—there's always a broke man involved.

Darrough is the only bankruptcy referee in the western federal district of Oklahoma and has refereed thousands of cases. Most of the cases appearing before him are "no asset" cases. Darrough explains that these are wage-earners who have gotten themselves over their ears in debt. Then someone starts garnisheeing their wages.

In his offices on the twenty-first floor of the Apco Tower in Oklahoma City, Darrough listens to the cases of businesses and individuals who have their finances in the red. He says the number of bankruptcy cases are on the increase and he takes this as a mirror of the nation's economy.

"I get quite a few businesses now and the number seems to be increasing. During the war prosperity years our cases fell off. We just didn't have any bankruptcy business at all," Darrough explains.

Darrough, who has been bankruptcy referee for 20 years, has a theory on what causes people to go bankrupt:

"It's mostly just over-extension of his credit. He buys more than he can pay for. Then he gets to borrowing money from finance companies to pay his other debts. Pretty soon he can't pay the finance company."

Brig. Gen. Louis A. Ledbetter, '12Law, retired 45th infantry division officer, died February 19 in St. Edwards Hospital in Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Ledbetter was state adjutant general when called into federal service in 1940 and had been an attorney at Wewoka. He served with the 45th division until 1942 when he became inspector general of the eighth service command, handling prisoners of war. Prior to that he had been in charge of Japanese and Italian prisoners of war at Lordsburg, New Mexico.

In 1944 he announced that he was being retired from the army because of ill health, and had been living recently on a ranch near McCurtain in Haskell County.
