

## **Biology Building Named**

June 13 the structure was known as the Biology Building. But not for long thereafter. When the Regents met June 14, they approved a recommendation by President Cross and the Campus Planning Committee to change the name to Richards Hall.

The name switch was made as a tribute to Dr. Aute Richards, former head of the department of zoology. He retired from the University staff June 4.

Richards Hall was completed in 1936. Dr. Richards helped lay the preliminary groundwork for the project. Now it bears his name. He retired with the title of professor of zoology after 30 years service.
