A Surplus Existed

10 Years Ago

Fall of 1940 saw the formal opening of a new museum on the University campus -a museum of classical antiquities. Dr. O. W. Reinmuth, professor of classical languages, assembled more than 125 Greek, Roman and Egyptian items for the showplace. Most valuable piece in the collection was an Italian war helmet dating back to 215 BC. It was found in Cannae, on the field where Hannibal once inflicted a sever defeat upon the Romans. The collection also included ancient jewelry, mirrors, glassware and papyrus documents.

Edwin Fast, '41ms, '46ph.d, was selected as the first recipient of the Halliburton industrial research fellowship at the University. A study was made of spectrum analysis of brines and similar solutions for correlation with underground structures. Fast is a research physicist in Bartlesville.
