O.U.'s First Student: A Sooner Sketch

As the University of Oklahoma celebrates its 60th birthday this fall, 74-year-old Dr. Marion Donehew is "O.U.'s Number One Boy."

Sixty years ago on September 15 a shy 14-year-old boy, accompanied by his mother, climbed the steps of the Rock building on Norman's Main street to enrol in the first classes at the University of Oklahoma.

"Mother and I did not know that I was the first to enrol until I passed the examinations and received the congratulations of the entire faculty," recalled Donehew, who lives on a farm near Stratford, Oklahoma.

"It didn't take long for the entire faculty to congratulate me, either," chuckled Donehew, "because there were only four faculty members. They all became my good friends—the first president, David Ross Boyd, Edwin C. DeBarr, F. S. E. Amos and W. N. Rice. The contacts and associates were so fine, and those men gave such friendly instruction."

Young master Donehew was all dressed up for the big occasion, in his first suit with long trousers and the old-style detachable shirt cuffs.

Donehew was born near Whitesboro, Texas, to Shields and Kate Crutchbury Donehew. His mother taught him to read and spell from Webster's *Elementary Spelling Book*, better known as the old blue back speller. He attended Center school near Whitesboro.

The family moved to Oklahoma in the spring of 1892, filing on a claim near McLoud. Interested in the educational advantages that the new University would bring, they moved to Norman in July, 1892.

"My father and I hauled some of the material and brick used in the construction of the first University building," Donehew said. "I also earned money while learning the printing and newspaper business at the People's Voice printing plant.

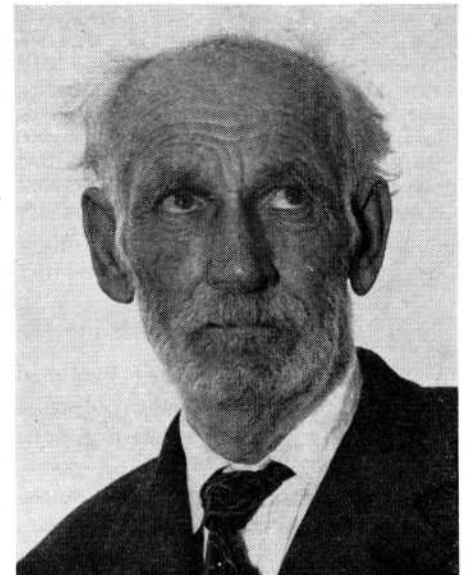
"I began work for 50 cents a week, the customary pay for all beginning printers. I was paying for my teaching at O.U. with my labor. In a little while I drew two dollars a week for part-time work, which was as much proportionately as grown young men were earning on other papers.

"I reported much of the University's happenings to John S. Allen, the editor. He wrote it up in his own way. I chased other

local news items for him and received many compliments from him for my service."

Some of those early day news items told of meetings of the literary and debating societies, the main social events for the O.U. crowd. Donehew was a star at these gatherings, which often were picnics.

Work at the University during the early years was very elementary. Many students had to master the three R's before they could tackle higher education. Standard

highschool courses of the time were offered. In 1893-94, second year of the University, the enrolment of 142 included one college freshman, seven in pharmacy, and the rest in the preparatory and music departments.

During his two semesters at O.U. Donehew studied algebra, general history, Latin, English and civil government. Enrolment was 57, growing to 119 by the year's end.

Donehew was well grounded in history, and amazed Professor Amos by the way he could rattle off facts and dates. In Professor Rice's language class he had another chance to display his knowledge when asked to diagram sentences. Algebra was more difficult. Some evenings he and a classmate met where Norman park is now to practice their "figuring."

It didn't cost Donehew much to go to
