On the Sooner Scene

In February the University of Oklahoma observed its sixtieth birthday with a weeklong celebration which included the dedication of seven buildings, lectures by distinguished scientists and scholars, receptions, and winding up with a record-breaking dinner in honor of President and Mrs. George L. Cross, held as a recognition of the ten years of outstanding leadership of President Cross.

This was a week of reflection, of evaluation, and of definition of objectives for the future. The chairman of the general committee on planning and organization was Dr. Laurence H. Snyder, dean of the Graduate College. Other members of the committee included Walter Kraft, director of Physical Plant; Savoie Lottinville, '29ba, director of the University Press; Carl M. Franklin, executive vice president; T. R. Benedum, '28Law, past president of the Alumni Association and member of the O.U. Board of Regents; Glenn C. Couch, '31bs, '37ms, dean of University College, George Goodman, professor of plant sciences; Boyd Gunning, '37ba, '37Law, executive secretary of the Alumni Association. Chairman of committees in charge of specific programs were Dr. Oliver Benson, '32ba; '33ma, for social sciences, Dr. Kenneth Crook, '25bs, '26ms, for chemistry; Miss Mary Warren for home economics. The deans in charge of various programs were Horace Brown, Business Administration, W. H. Carson, Engineering, John R. Rackley, '31ba, '35ma, Education, James G. Harlow, '31ba, '33ms, Arts and Sciences, and Mark R. Everett, Medicine.

Oklahoma City. One of the most impressive ceremonies of the week was the dedication of a commemorative stone located in the center of the South Oval opposite the statue of Dr. William Bennett Bizzell. On this stone is inscribed the following:

"This is our heritage: the traditional Sooner spirit, born at the crossroads of frontier migration, with its faith in the comman man, its optimism for the morrow, its respect for the open mind, and its reliance upon Divine leadership. To it the faculty and staff of the University of Oklahoma rededicate themselves on the sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the institution."

President Cross opened the ground breaking ceremonies for the new Chapel with these words:

"We have assembled here this morning to dedicate a portion of our campus to spiritual values and to break ground for a beautiful new student chapel, The Fred Jones, Jr., Memorial Chapel, which will be constructed here through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Jones of Oklahoma City. In my opinion, this is by far the finest and most significant gift that the University has received during the first sixty years of its existence."

An address was made at the ceremonies by Dr. J. Clayton Feaver, Kingfisher Professor of Ethics and Religion:

"Today, in this act of the dedication of this ground for the foundation for a memorial chapel, we join ourselves with the countless generations that have preceded us and with those yet to come in solemn and sacred recognition of the human conviction that we as human beings belong meaningfully to the larger order of things. The chapel, soon to be erected hereon, liftnig its spires high into the sky, will be a symbol of our present acknowledgment of this perennial human concern to atune ourselves, creature with creature, to the Creator of all things...

"Here it is our business to introduce ourselves to the wholeness of life. However thorough our education may be in the physical and biological sciences, engineering, law, medicine, the social sciences, the humanities, the fine arts, it is not complete until we have brought ourselves to consider the claims of religion upon us."

During the course of the week thousands of alumni re-visited the campus to participate in the celebration of this University birthday and to honor President Cross for

of several of their men to attend the University for instruction in statically indeterminate structures. And the results can be seen in the overpass on the new road between Norman and Oklahoma City.

Although still functional in special instances, truss bridges are beginning to fade out and are gradually being replaced by the modern designed arch bridge and rigid frame. The only restraining governor, stopping the contemporary movement, is the lack of professional knowledge concerning these type of structures; Mills' courses are designed to accelerate the dispersal of the needed know-how.

To be able to present this modern trend to students, Mills had to evolve several new courses: Fundamental Theory of Statically Indeterminate Stress, Practical Problems in Highway Bridge Design (The Reinforced Concrete Arch), Advanced Statically Indeterminate Stress, Theoretical Stress Analysis of Building Frames, Practical Problems in Building Frames, and The Skewed Rigid Frame.

Keeping pace with the modern design trend, Joe Keely, '30eng, '46p.c.eng, chairman of the civil engineering department, has developed a graduate course for structural engineering in Soils and Substructure Analysis.

Mills is rated as one of the outstanding men in structural design in the Southwest and his efforts at the University have brought national acclaim.

Not only will O.U. civil engineers refrain from "spoiling good fishing holes with gawky trusses," but they will contribute to the economies of the communities they serve by being prepared to design structures that are easier on the eye, cheaper to build, and more efficiently designed.
