Brief news stories by classes of alumni of University of Oklahoma.

'01 Dr. Milton J. Ferguson, '01ba, '06ma, former librarian of the University, died October 23, in Brooklyn, New York. Ferguson, 75, was chief librarian of the Brooklyn Public Library for 19 years prior to his death. He made the run into Oklahoma with his parents in 1889 and settled in Norman. He helped build the first building on the campus by driving a mule which hauled and hoisted brick. Later he worked his way through college here. He served a 2-year term as president of the University of Oklahoma Alumni Association (1906-08).

'02 Oscar W. Johnson, '02pharm, retired advertising salesman, died November 1, in Oklahoma City. Johnson, 75, at one time was an advertising representative for the *Saturday Evening Post*. Surviving are his wife and a daughter, Mrs. Lynn Poole, both of Baltimore, and a son, O. W. Johnson, Jr., Burbank, California.

'07 Wallace Perry, '07ba, has been named editor of the *New Mexico Farm and Ranch* in addition to his position as general manager. The magazine is a publication of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau.

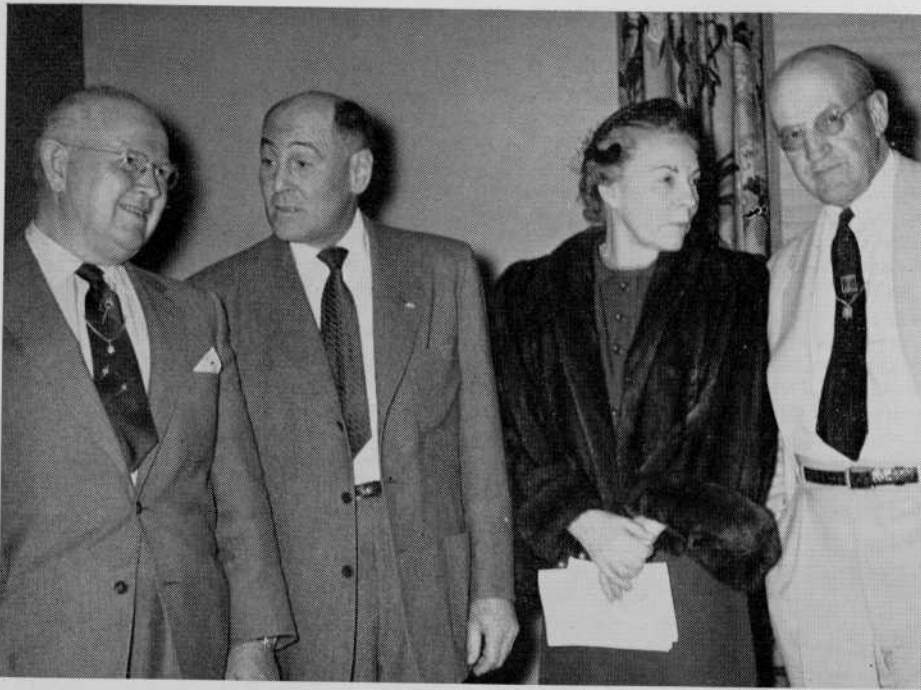
