He will be in company with several leading business men from across the nation and is the only representative chosen from the Middle West. Others who will make the trip include the president of Time-Life International; the governor of Tennessee, and financial representatives of larger banking, industrial and agricultural institutions throughout the nation. This will be his third trip to Latin America in the
