1893

Nahum E. Butcher, '93, retired in November, 1957, from his job at Tinker Air Force Base where he was in charge of the message center for the 12,000 employees of maintenance engineering. Butcher, 85, was honored by the military and civilian leaders with a retirement party. He holds the honor of being the first freshman to enroll at the University of Oklahoma in 1893.

1908

Mrs. J. A. Stanley (the former Mary Ingold, '08mus) is living in Santa Rosa, California. She

is a member of the Sonoma County Chorus which performed Handel's "Messiah" December 15 on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus.

1910

Ben C. Belt, '10ba, is author of an article, "Our Rightful Place," which appeared in the December, 1957, issue of *Houston* magazine. Belt, president of the Houston, Texas, Chamber of Commerce, also authored the official president's message on business for the issue, and a photograph of him appeared on the publication's cover. He is brother of the former Blanche Belt, '10ba, now married to Dr. A. C. Shead, retired professor of chemistry of the University of Oklahoma.

DEATH: Mrs. C. R. Chaney (the former Julia Meier, '11mus) died September 6, 1957. Mrs. Chaney lived in Sanger, California, at the time of her death. She was the daughter of Professor Henry Meier who taught German and astronomy at O. U.

Dr. Angie Debo, '18ba, '33ph.d., Oklahoma State University history professor, and Dr. Emma Estill-Harbour, '23ma, '33ph.d., of Central State College, Edmond, participated in the program for the opening meeting of the Oklahoma college history professors at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. With Dr. E. E. Dale, University of Oklahoma, they gave their reminiscences of early days in Oklahoma. All three lived in Oklahoma before statchood.

DEATH: Mrs. Horace Taylor (the former Louise Bierer, '18ba) died after a prolonged illness at her home in New York on November 29, 1957. Her funeral was in St. Paul's Chapel, Columbia University. B. H. Flippen, '47eng, and family have moved from Fort Worth, Texas, to Silver Springs, Maryland.





JUST PLAIN BILL

O NE MAN DOWN MEXICO way cannot forget his student days at the University of Oklahoma. Guillermo Pedro Salas acquired more than an education during his years on the campus: he acquired a new name, too.

Salas, a six-footer who lives in the heart of Mexico City with his wife and family, has been director of the Mexican Geological Institute since 1955, and in 1957 he was appointed by President Ruiz Cortines to the board of directors of Non-Renewable Mineral Resources. He spends a great deal of time moving quickly from one part of his country to the other, and even through Central America, supervising hydracarbon analysis methods for the company of which he is president—Rotary Engineering Co de Mexico—and generally acting as a geological consultant backed by years of hard experience.

However, those whom he contacts no longer know him as Guillermo; today he is called Bill Salas.

After coming to O. U. in 1932 from Monterey, Mexico, to study engineering, Salas found that his given name proved difficult for classmates and professors to pronounce. In no time at all he and they changed it to Bill. That's what they called him as he worked his way through school serving as a houseboy for the Pi Beta Phi sorority. That's what they called him when he received his degree in geological engineering in 1937.

After graduation he joined Seismograph Service Company as a seismic computer, then moved on to Carter Oil Company as a subsurface geologist. During the next couple years he worked as director of Exploraciones Geoffsicas Mexicanas, locating minerals and water in the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, Mexico, and for Petroleos Mexicanos as a surface geologist. In 1947 he was appointed chief geologist for the latter company, and two years later he stepped into the presidency of both Rotary Engineering Co de Mexico and Geologos Consultores Asociados S. A.

Positions held since include consultant to the Cuban government for petroleum affairs and geological consultant to the Guatemalan and Honduras governments. He has even found time to squeeze in teaching a course in petroleum engineering at the University of Mexico.

It almost goes without saying that Salas is a busy man indeed, and a remarkably successful one. But wherever his schedule takes him, whatever new titles he picks up along the way, he is no longer Guillermo, but just plain Bill—the name he received a quarter-century ago in Norman, Oklahoma.



Following is the reply of Heflin, whose latest film is Columbia Pictures' 3:10 to Yuma.

T ODAY, MORE THAN at any other time in our history, institutions of higher learning as personified by the University of Oklahoma, face grave responsibilities.

The need for college graduates, educated by capable faculties for careers in science, education and industry is especially acute in these days where current newspaper headlines read of satellites, cold war and inflation.
